

Use the following safety guidelines to help ensure your own personal safety and to help protect your device and working environment from potential damage.

SAFETY: General

- Do not attempt to service the device yourself unless you are a trained service technician.
 Always follow installation instructions closely.
- If you use an extension power cable with your AC adapter, ensure that the total
 ampere rating of the products plugged in to the extension power cable does not exceed
 the ampere rating of the extension cable.
- Do not push objects into air vents or openings of your device. Doing so can cause fire
 or electric shock by shorting out interior components.
- Keep your device away from radiators and heat sources. Also, do not block cooling
 vents. Avoid placing loose papers underneath your device; do not place your device in
 a closed-in wall unit or on a bed, sofa, or rug.
- Place the AC adapter in a ventilated area, such as a desk top or on the floor, when you
 use it to run the device or to charge the battery. Do not cover the AC adapter with papers
 or other items that will reduce cooling; also, do not use the AC adapter inside a
 carrying case.
- The AC adapter may become hot during normal operation of your device. Use care
 when handling the adapter during or immediately after operation.
- Do not use your device in a wet environment, for example, near a bath tub, sink, or swimming pool or in a wet basement.
- If your device includes an integrated or optional (PC Card) modem, disconnect the
 modem cable if an electrical storm is approaching to avoid the remote risk of electric
 shock from lightning via the telephone line.
- To help avoid the potential hazard of electric shock, do not connect or disconnect any
 cables or perform maintenance or reconfiguration of this product during an electrical
 storm. Do not use your device during an electrical storm unless all cables have been
 disconnected and the device is operating on battery power.
- If your device includes a modem, the cable used with the modem should be manufactured with a minimum wire size of 26 American wire gauge (AWG) and an FCC-compliant RJ-11 modular plug.
- PC Cards may become very warm during normal operation. Use care when removing PC Cards after their continuous operation.
- Before you clean your device, disconnect the device from the electrical outlet. Clean
 your device with a soft cloth dampened with water. Do not use liquid or aerosol
 cleaners, which may contain flammable substances.

SAFETY: Power

- Use only the Dell-provided AC adapter approved for use with this device. Use of another AC adapter may cause a fire or explosion.
- Before you connect the device to an electrical outlet, check the AC adapter voltage rating to ensure that the required voltage and frequency match the available power source.
- To remove the device from all power sources, turn the device off, disconnect the AC adapter from the electrical outlet, and remove the battery installed in the battery bay.
- To help prevent electric shock, plug the AC adapter and device power cables into properly grounded power sources. These power cables may be equipped with 3-prong plugs to provide an earth grounding connection. Do not use adapter plugs or remove the grounding prong from the power cable plug. If you use a power extension cable, use the appropriate type, 2-prong or 3-prong, to mate with the AC adapter power cable.
- Be sure that nothing rests on your AC adapter's power cable and that the cable is not located where it can be tripped over or stepped on.
- If you are using a multiple-outlet power strip, use caution when plugging the AC adapter's power cable into the power strip. Some power strips may allow you to insert the plug incorrectly. Incorrect insertion of the power plug could result in permanent damage to your device, as well as risk of electric shock and/or fire. Ensure that the ground prong of the power plug is inserted into the mating ground contact of the power strip.

SAFETY: Batterv

- Use only Dell™ battery modules that are approved for use with this device. Use of other types may increase the risk of fire or explosion.
- Do not carry a battery pack in your pocket, purse, or other container where metal objects (such as car keys or paper clips) could short-circuit the battery terminals. The resulting excessive current flow can cause extremely high temperatures and may result in damage to the battery pack or cause fire or burns.
- The battery poses a burn hazard if you handle it improperly. Do not disassemble it. Handle a damaged or leaking battery pack with extreme care. If the battery is damaged, electrolyte may leak from the cells and may cause personal injury.
- Keep the battery away from children.

When Using Your Device

Observe the following safe-handling guidelines to prevent damage to your device:

- When setting up the device for work, place it on a level surface.
- When traveling, do not check the device as baggage. You can put your device through an X-ray security machine, but never put your device through a metal detector. If you have the device checked by hand, be sure to have a charged battery available in case you are asked to turn on the device.
- When traveling, do not place the device in overhead storage compartments where it could slide around. Do not drop your device or subject it to other mechanical shocks.
- Protect your device and battery from environmental hazards such as dirt, dust, food, liquids, temperature extremes, and overexposure to sunlight.

- When you move your device between environments with very different temperature and/or humidity ranges, condensation may form on or within the device. To avoid damaging the device, allow sufficient time for the moisture to evaporate before using the device.
- **NOTICE:** When taking the device from low-temperature conditions into a warmer environment or from high-temperature conditions into a cooler environment, allow the device to acclimate to room temperature before turning on power.
- When you disconnect a cable, pull on its connector or on its strain-relief loop, not on the cable itself. As you pull out the connector, keep it evenly aligned to avoid bending any connector pins. Also, before you connect a cable make sure both connectors are correctly oriented and aligned.
- Handle components with care. Hold a component such as a memory module by its edges, not its pins.
- Clean the display with a soft, clean cloth and water. Apply the water to the cloth; then stroke the cloth across the display in one direction, moving from the top of the display to the bottom. Remove moisture from the display quickly and keep the display dry. Long-term exposure to moisture can damage the display. Do not use a commercial window cleaner to clean your display.

- When unpacking a static-sensitive component from its shipping carton, do not remove the component from the antistatic packing material until you are ready to install the component. Just before unwrapping the antistatic packaging, be sure to discharge static electricity from your body.
- When transporting a sensitive component, first place it in an antistatic container or packaging.
- Handle all sensitive components in a static-safe area. If possible, use antistatic floor pads and workbench pads.







Using the Battery

Your device ships with a standard 1100 mAH (milli-Ampere-Hour) battery with an expected minimum of 5-8 hours of battery life. A higher capacity 2200 mAH can also be purchased. The 2200 mAH battery has an expected minimum battery life of 10-16 hours.






Installing and Removing the Battery

To install the battery:





Charging the Battery

You must charge your battery before using it for the first time. Subsequently, recharge the battery every time it runs low (power button light flashes amber).

Use one of the following options to charge the main battery:

- Connect the AC adapter directly to the charger adapter and then connect the charger adapter to the device.
- Connect the AC adapter to the sync cable and then connect the sync cable to the device. See, "Using the Sync Cable" on page 60.
- Connect the AC adapter to the cradle, and insert the device into the cradle. See "Using the Cradle" on page 56 for more information.
- Connect the cradle with the device to a running computer. See "USB Charging" on page 58. Also see the placemat for details.

The standard battery pack (1100mAh) completely charges within 5 hours; the higher battery pack (2200mAh) completely charges within 10 hours.

If the main battery is critically low, the device enters "sleep" mode and the device turns off



NOTE: To prevent data loss, a portion of the main battery will keep data safe for 72 hours if your device enters sleep mode. An additional battery, the internal backup battery, is designed to keep your data safe when you remove the main battery. The internal backup battery will keep data safe for 30 minutes.

To recover from a critically low battery:

- Plug in the AC adapter or replace the main battery with a charged battery.
- Press the power button to turn on the device.

By default, the device turns off if the device is left unused for a period of time. This is called the sleep mode. For information on setting the amount of time during which the device can remain idle before it turns off, see "System Tab" on page 82.



- When the battery is being charged, the power button light is solid amber.
- When the device relays a notification, the power button light rapidly flashes green.






NOTE: Before connecting your device to a computer for the first time, install ActiveSync on the computer using the *Dell™ Getting Started* CD.

To connect your device to the cradle:

- Connect the AC adapter to the cradle and to an electrical outlet.
- Place the Axim in the docking cradle near your computer.
- Connect the USB sync cable to the cradle and the computer.





When the device is docked in the cradle, the power button on the device turns on and the connection status icon appears on the command bar (see page 65).



NOTE: The power button on the device indicates the charge status of the main battery. See the description of the power button lights on page 55 for more information.

The spare battery status light on the cradle operates as follows:

- Green The spare battery is fully charged.
- Amber The spare battery is charging.

To remove the device from the cradle, pull the device straight up and out of the cradle.

USB Charging

You can charge your device battery when the cradle with the device is connected to a running computer by a USB cable.



NOTE: USB charging will not take place if the device is turned on.

You can charge the battery using a 5V/500 mA USB port when the device is turned off.




NOTE: Using an external USB hub with 5V/100 mA ports to charge the device battery may cause a temporary voltage drop in the hub, and other USB devices connected to the ports on the hub may not work normally until the device is removed.




NOTE: Charging the battery through a USB port takes more time than direct AC adapter charging.

The device charger stops the charging process after seven hours. If you need more than seven hours to charge the device battery, disconnect and reconnect the USB cable to restart the charging process.




Using the Sync Cable

Use the sync cable to connect your device directly to the computer without using the cradle.



To connect the sync cable:

- 1 Connect the sync cable connector to your device. Ensure that the Dell logo is facing upwards.
- **2** Connect the USB connector of the cable to the USB connector on your computer.
- NOTICE: To avoid damaging the sync cable connector, press the two buttons on the sides of the connector to release the lock before inserting or pulling out the connector.



Connecting to a Projector

You can connect the device to a projector using a VGA cable.



NOTE: The VGA option is available only with the VGA model of the device. The VGA cable will not ship with your device unless you order it.



NOTE: You need to install the **Viewer** program from the CD for the device to detect the projector. To configure the program, see the Help section in the program.

To connect the device to the projector, connect the sync connector on the VGA cable to the device, and then connect the other connector of the VGA cable to the projector cable. Run the Viewer program for the device to detect the projector.

Using Cards

Your device has two slots located on the top of the unit. The larger slot supports CompactFlash Type II cards. The smaller slot supports Secure Digital (SD) memory cards, Secure Digital I/O (SDIO) cards, and the MultiMediaCard (MMC). All three memory card types are available in sizes from 64 MB to 1 GB or 2 GB.

CompactFlash Cards


Your device supports CompactFlash Type II cards. Some common types of cards include:

- Modem Connect a telephone line for modem data communication.
- Wireless communication Data communication without the use of cable connections. You can use cards, such as internal cards with Bluetooth wireless technology and 802.11b wireless LAN.
- Storage Save data or install programs on a storage card.

When you do not have a CompactFlash card installed, insert the plastic blank to protect the CompactFlash card slot.

To install a CompactFlash card:

1 If a blank is installed, remove it.



- 2 Align the tab on the back of the CompactFlash card with the notch in the CompactFlash card slot, and slide the card into the slot.
- **NOTICE:** Do not force the card. If you feel resistance, remove the card, check the orientation, and reinsert it.



Secure Digital Memory Cards

Use Secure Digital memory cards to save or back up data.

To install a Secure Digital memory card:

If a card or plastic blank is already installed, press in to release it, and then remove it.



- **2** Ensure that the card is oriented correctly, and slide it into the slot until you feel a click.
- **NOTICE:** Do not force the card. If you feel resistance, remove the card, check the orientation, and reinsert it.



Resetting the Axim

Soft Reset

When you do a soft reset, the device deletes any data that has not been saved in the ROM. In other words, your saved files and programs are not deleted. Try a soft reset if the device does not respond when you tap the display or press a button.

To do a soft reset, use the stylus to press the reset button.



Hard Reset

NOTICE: When you do a hard reset, you lose all the data stored in your device flash memory, and any programs that you installed on your device.

Do a hard reset if:

- You want to restore the device to factory default settings.
- You forget your password and need to reset it.
- Your device is experiencing severe operational problems and you have already attempted a soft reset.
- **NOTICE:** It is strongly recommended that you back up your data before you do a hard reset. See your *Getting Started Guide* that is available on the upgrade CD.

To do a hard reset:

- Press and hold the power button.
- Using the stylus, hold down the reset button for about 2 seconds.
- Follow the instructions on the screen.

Using Microsoft[®] Windows Mobile[™] Version 5.0 software for Pocket PC Premium Edition

The Windows Mobile 5.0 operating system comes with a host of new features and interface improvements. The screen view and touchpad is similar to Windows[™] XP for computers. RAM is only used for running applications. ROM is where all application, PIM data, and file storage happens. For details, visit the www.microsoft.com website.

Programs

You can switch from one program to another by selecting a program from the Start menu. To access programs that are not listed in the Start menu, tap Start — Programs, and then tap the program name.



NOTE: Some programs have abbreviated labels for check boxes and drop-down menus. To see the full spelling of an abbreviated label, tap and hold the stylus on the label. Drag the stylus off the label so that the command is not carried out.

Program Buttons

You can also switch to some programs by pressing a program button. Your device has four program buttons located on the front of the device. The icons on the buttons identify the programs which they start. By default, the buttons launch Home, Messaging, Contacts, and Calendar.

Switcher Bar

You can also use Switcher Bar to switch to or close the open programs. To launch Switcher Bar:

- Tap Start →Settings.
- Tap System →Switcher Bar.

The Switcher Bar icon, papears in the navigation bar.

Tap to view a list of all open programs. In the Switcher Bar menu:

- Tap Brightness settings or Power settings to configure those settings.
- Tap a program name to switch to that program.
- Tap Exit current program to close the current program.
- Tap Exit all programs to close all open programs.
- Tap Exit Switcher Bar to close the menu.



Navigation Bar and Command Bar


The navigation bar is located at the top of the screen. It displays the active program and current time, and allows you to switch to other programs or close screens.

Use the command bar at the bottom of the screen to perform tasks in programs. The command bar includes menu names, icons, and the input panel icon. To create a new item in the current program, tap New. To see the name of an icon, tap and hold the stylus on the icon. Drag the stylus off the icon so that the command is not carried out.



Pop-Up Menus

With pop-up menus, you can quickly select an action for an item. For example, you can use the pop-up menu in the contact list to delete a contact, make a copy, or send an e-mail message to a contact. The actions in the pop-up menus vary from program to program. To access a pop-up menu, tap and hold the stylus on an item name. When the menu appears, lift the stylus and tap the action you want to perform. To close the menu without performing an action, tap anywhere outside the menu.




Searching for Information

The Search feature on your device helps you to quickly locate information.

To search for files or other items:

- 1 Tap Start → Programs → Search.
- 2 In Search for, enter the file name, word, or other information you want. If you have looked for this item before, tap the Search for arrow to select the item from the list.
- **3** In Type, select a data type to help narrow your search.
- **4** Tap **Search**. The **My Documents** folder and subfolders are searched.
- **5** In the **Results** list, tap the item you want to open.

You can also use File Explorer to find files on your device and to organize your files into folders. On the Start menu, tap Programs — File Explorer.



Backing Up Data

To prevent or minimize data loss, you should periodically back up the data stored on your device. Use ActiveSync to synchronize the files on your device with the files on your computer. You can also drag and drop files from your device to your computer using Windows Explorer. See the ActiveSync Help on your computer for additional information. Also see, "Installing and Using ActiveSync" on page 86.



NOTE: To prevent data loss, a portion of the main battery will keep data safe for 72 hours if your device runs out of power. An additional battery, the internal backup battery, is designed to keep your data safe when you remove the main battery. The internal backup battery will keep data safe for 30 minutes.

Entering Information

You have several options for entering information:

- Use the input panel to enter typed text using the soft keyboard or another input method.
- Write directly on the screen using the stylus.
- Draw pictures on the screen with the stylus.
- Speak into your device microphone to record a message.


Use Microsoft® ActiveSync® to synchronize or copy information from your computer to your device. For more information, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.



NOTE: Some of the functions mentioned in this section may not be supported by the operating system in some languages.


Entering Text Using the Input Panel

Use the input panel to enter information into any program on your device. You can type using the soft keyboard or write with the stylus using Letter Recognizer, Block Recognizer, or Transcriber. The characters appear as typed text on the screen.



To show or hide the input panel, tap the input panel icon. Tap the arrow next to the input panel icon to change the input method.

When you use the input panel, your device anticipates the word you are typing or writing and displays it above the input panel. When you tap the displayed word, the word is inserted at the insertion point. The more you use your device, the more words it learns to anticipate.



To change word suggestion options, for example, the number of words suggested:

- Tap Start → Settings → Personal → Input.
- Tap the Word Completion tab.
- Select the desired settings and tap OK.

Typing With the Soft Keyboard

- Tap the input selection arrow and tap **Keyboard**.
- Tap the keys on the soft keyboard with your stylus.

Letter Recognizer

Letter Recognizer allows you to use your stylus to write letters on the screen as you would write them on paper.



NOTE: Letter Recognizer is included with the English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish operating systems. Other versions do not support Letter Recognizer.

- Tap the input selection arrow and tap Letter Recognizer. 1
- 2 Write characters, numbers, and symbols in the designated writing area.
 - Enter capital letters by writing in the ABC (left) area of the box.
 - Enter lower case letters by writing in the abc (middle) area of the box.
 - Enter numbers by writing in the 123 (right) area of the box.
 - Enter punctuation and symbols by tapping in any area of the box and then writing the desired character.

The letters are converted to typed text on the screen. For specific instructions on using Letter Recognizer, tap the question mark next to the writing area.



NOTE: Tap **Demo** to learn the character strokes that the device can recognize.

Block Recognizer

Block Recognizer allows you to use character strokes that are similar to those used on other handheld devices.



NOTE: Block Recognizer is included with the English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish operating systems. Other versions do not support Block Recognizer.

- Tap the input selection arrow and tap Block Recognizer.
- Write characters, numbers, and symbols in the designated writing area.
 - Enter letters by writing in the abc (left) area of the box.
 - Enter numbers by writing in the 123 (right) area of the box.
 - Enter symbols and punctuation by tapping in either area of the box and then writing the desired character.

The character strokes are converted to typed text on the screen. For specific instructions on using Block Recognizer, tap the question mark next to the writing area.



NOTE: Tap **Demo** to learn the character strokes that the device can recognize.

Transcriber

Transcriber allows you to write anywhere on the screen using the stylus similar to the way that you would write on paper. Unlike Letter Recognizer and Block Recognizer, you can write a sentence or more, and then pause to let Transcriber change the written characters to typed characters.

- NOTE: Transcriber is included with the English, French, and German operating systems. Other versions do not support Transcriber.
 - Start a program such as Word Mobile.
 - Tap the Input Panel icon at the bottom center of the screen and tap the input selection arrow to the right of the icon.
 - Tap Transcriber. The Transcriber introductory screen appears.
 - With your stylus, write anywhere on the screen. When you pause, Transcriber converts your written characters to typed characters. For specific instructions on using Transcriber, tap the question mark in the lower right hand corner of the screen.

Writing on the Screen

In any program that accepts written text, such as the Notes program and the Notes tab in some programs, you can use your stylus to write directly on the screen. You can edit and format what you have written and convert the information to text at a later time.




Editing Written Text

To edit or format written text:

- **1** Drag the stylus across the text that you want to select.
- **2** Tap and hold the selected text.
- 3 Tap the appropriate editing command in the pop-up menu.
 You can also tap Menu —Ædit at the bottom of the screen to select editing commands.


To convert written text to print-style text, tap Menu → Tools and tap Recognize.



If you want to convert only certain words, select them before tapping Recognize (or tap and hold the selected words and then tap Recognize on the pop-up menu). If a word is not recognized, it is not converted to print-style text.

If the conversion is incorrect, you can select different words from a list of alternatives or return to the original written text:

- Tap and hold the incorrect word.
- On the pop-up menu, tap Alternates. A menu with a list of alternative words appears.
- Tap the correct word, or tap the written text at the top of the menu to return to the original written text.



Tips for getting good recognition:

- Write neatly.
- Write on the lines and draw descenders below the line. Write the cross of the "t" and apostrophes below the top line so that they are not confused with the word above. Write periods and commas above the line.
- For better recognition, try changing the zoom level to 300 percent by tapping Menu →Zoom.
- Write the letters of a word closely and leave big gaps between words so that the device can easily determine where words begin and end.
- You cannot convert hyphenated words, foreign words that use special characters such as accents, and some punctuation.
- You cannot add written text to a word to change it after the word has been recognized. You must delete the written word and write the new word.

Drawing on the Screen


You can draw on the screen the same way that you write on the screen. However, selecting and editing drawings is different than selecting and editing written text. For example, selected drawings can be resized, while written text cannot.

Creating a Drawing



NOTE: To zoom in or out on your drawing, tap Menu →Zoom and tap a zoom level.

Cross three ruled lines on your first stroke. A drawing box appears. Subsequent strokes that touch or are inside of the drawing box become part of the drawing. Drawings that do not cross three ruled lines are treated as written text.



Editing a Drawing

To edit or format a drawing, you must first select it:

- Tap and hold the stylus on the drawing until the selection handles appear. To select multiple drawings, drag to select the drawings.
- You can cut, copy, and paste selected drawings by tapping and holding the selected drawings and then tapping an editing command on the pop-up menu.
 - You can also tap Menu Edit at the bottom of the screen to select editing commands.

To resize a drawing, drag a selection handle.

Recording a Message

In any program where you can write or draw on the screen, you can also quickly capture thoughts, reminders, and phone numbers by recording a message.

- In Calendar, Tasks, and Contacts, you can include a recording in the Notes tab.
- In the Notes program, you can either create a stand-alone recording or include a recording in a written note. If you want to include the recording in a note, open the note first.
- In the Messaging program, you can add a recording to an e-mail message.


To record a message:

- 1 Hold the microphone near your mouth or other source of sound.
- Press and hold the Record button on the side of your device until it beeps.
- While holding down the **Record** button, make your recording. 3
- To stop recording, release the **Record** button. The device beeps twice. The new recording appears in the note list or as an embedded icon.
- **NOTE:** You can also make a recording by tapping the **Record** icon on the Recording toolbar.

To play a recording, tap the name of the recording in the list or tap the speaker icon in the note.

Using My Text

When using Messaging or MSN Messenger, use My Text to quickly insert preset or frequently used messages. To insert a message, tap Menu →My Text and tap a message.



NOTE: You can add text to a **My Text** message after you insert the message.

To edit a My Text message:

- Tap Menu \rightarrow My Text \rightarrow Edit My Text Messages.
- Make the changes and tap **OK**.

Adjusting Settings

You can adjust the device settings to suit the way you work. To see available options, tap Start —Settings.



NOTE: Depending on the features of your device, you might have additional tabs and additional items on the tabs.

See your device Help for additional information on adjusting settings (tap Start → Help).

Personal Tab

- **Buttons** Assign the programs that launch when you press the device buttons.
- **Input** Adjust the settings for input method, word completion, and other options.
- Menus Add or remove items from the Start menu.
- Owner Information Enter your contact information.
- **Password** Set a password to protect the data stored on your device.
- **Sounds & Notification** Adjust the volume and set notifications. See "Notifications" on page 98 for more information.
- **Today** Customize the look and the information that is displayed on the Today screen.
- MSN Options Settings you can use to create a custom Pocket MSN experience.

System Tab

- **About** Find information about Windows Mobile 5.0 and your device.
- Brightness Adjust the brightness settings to conserve power.
- **Certificates** View or delete certificates stored on your device. Certificates help establish your identity and the identity of other computers to prevent unauthorized users from accessing your data.
- Clock & Alarms Change the time and set the alarm.
- Memory Allocate memory for data and program storage. View free and used memory, storage card memory, and running programs.
- Error Reporting Send information needed by technical support groups to diagnose a program error for a device running Windows Mobile software. For this your device must be connected to the Internet.
- GPS Configure the settings when you have a GPS device connected to understand the exact location you are in, with the help of the maps. Note that your Axim does not have a built-in GPS device.

- Mirror Mode This is available only in the X50v model. Mirror mode allows users to see the same image on both the PDA screen and on an external display using a VGA cable. When enabled, an icon will be displayed on the command bar. To disable mirror mode, click on the icon or clear the checkbox.
- Microphone Adjust the microphone volume.
- Power Check the battery or charge status. Use the Advanced tab to set the amount of time that the device can remain idle before it turns off. .
- Regional Settings View and change the formatting for regional settings such as currency, time, and date.
- Remove Programs Remove programs from your device. For more information, see "Adding and Removing Programs" on page 115.
- Screen Adjust the screen if your device is not responding accurately to taps, and select the screen orientation that you want to use.
- Switcher Bar Adjust the settings of the Switcher Bar program launcher utility.
- **System Information** View technical information about your device.

Connections Tab

- **Beam** Receive infrared beams from other devices
- Bluetooth Turn on and off the radio with Bluetooth® wireless technology, and create and edit bonded devices. By default, the radio is off.
- **Connections** Add and configure modem and server connections.
- **Dell WLAN Utility** Available only on devices with internal Wi-Fi. Use the WLAN utility to connect to the wireless network using EAP/TTLS
- Network Cards Configure your network adapter settings.
- Odyssey Client Provides secure authentication and connection of wireless LAN (WLAN). This is available for Mid and Hi end Axim versions only.


Communicating and Scheduling

About Microsoft®ActiveSync® Program

Microsoft ActiveSync 4.0 is the latest synchronization software for the Axim. ActiveSync transfers files and data between your device and a computer. It can upload drivers and programs to the device. ActiveSync should be installed before connecting the device to a computer. You can find the ActiveSync installation program on the Dell Getting Started CD.

You can synchronize the information on your computer with the information on your device using ActiveSync. This compares the data on your device with the data on your computer and updates both with the most recent information. For example:


- Keep Microsoft Pocket Outlook data up-to-date by synchronizing your device with Microsoft Outlook data on your computer.
- Synchronize Microsoft Word and Microsoft Excel files between your device and your computer. Your files are automatically converted to the correct format.




With ActiveSync, you can also:

- Copy (rather than synchronize) files between your device and your computer.
- Select a mode to control when synchronization occurs. For example, you can synchronize continuously or only when you select the synchronize command.
- Select which information types are synchronized and control how much data is synchronized. For example, you can choose how many weeks of past appointments you want synchronized.

To synchronize your data, you need both the Microsoft Windows® and Pocket PC versions of ActiveSync. You must install the Windows version of ActiveSync on your computer using the Dell™ Getting Started CD. The Pocket PC version is already installed on your device.





Installing and Using ActiveSync

To install ActiveSync:

- Insert the Dell Getting Started CD.
- 2 Click Getting Started to access the main menu.
- 3 Click Start Here.
- Click **Install ActiveSync** and follow the instructions on the screen.

After the installation is complete, connect your device to your computer. The ActiveSync Setup Wizard enables you to:

- Set up a partnership so that you can synchronize information between your device and your computer
- Customize your synchronization settings

Your first synchronization process automatically begins when you complete the wizard

NOTE: The device must be powered on for the synchronization process to occur.

During your first synchronization, information that was stored in Outlook on your computer is copied to Calendar, Contacts, and Tasks on your device.

After you set up ActiveSync and complete the first synchronization process, you can initiate synchronization from your device. To switch to ActiveSync on your device, tap **Start** —**ActiveSync**.

To find information on using ActiveSync on your device, open ActiveSync on your device and tap **Start** —**Help**.

To find information on using ActiveSync on your computer, click Help →Microsoft ActiveSync Help.

About Microsoft® Pocket Outlook

Pocket Outlook includes Calendar, Contacts, Tasks, Messaging, and Notes. You can use these programs individually or together. For example, e-mail addresses stored in Contacts can be used to address e-mail messages in Messaging.



NOTE: Pocket Outlook is pre-installed on your device. If not already installed, your Dell Getting Started CD has a copy of the Pocket Outlook installation program. Ensure that you install Pocket Outlook and not Outlook Express. Note that you can only install Pocket Outlook once, as it is a licensed version.

Using Microsoft ActiveSync[®], you can synchronize information on your computer in Microsoft Outlook or Microsoft Exchange. You can also synchronize this information directly with an Exchange server. Each time you synchronize, ActiveSync compares the changes you made on your device and computer or server and updates both with the latest information. For information on using ActiveSync, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.

You can switch to any of the following programs through the **Start** menu.



NOTE: For detailed information about Calendar, Contacts, Tasks, Messaging, and Notes, among other things, see Help on your device.

Categories

Use categories to group related contacts, tasks, and appointments. For example, you can assign work-related contacts to the Business category and personal contacts to the Personal category so that you can quickly find contact information. You can also create your own categories, such as Family, to group your relatives' contact information.

Creating a Category


To create a category:

- From the program, tap an existing item or create a new one.
- For a new item in Calendar, Contacts, and Tasks, tap Categories.
- Tap New, enter the category name, and tap Done. The new category is automatically assigned to the item.

- **4** For an existing item in Calendar and Tasks, tap **Edit** →**Categories**.
- **5** For an existing item in Contacts, tap Menu Edit Categories.
- **6** Tap **OK** to return to the appointment, contact, or task.

Calendar

Use Calendar to schedule appointments, including meetings and other events. You can check your appointments in one of several views (Agenda, Day, Week, Month, and Year) and easily switch views by using the view menu. Tap the **Today** icon to view the current date.



NOTE: To customize Calendar, such as changing the first day of the week, tap **Menu** and tap **Options**.

To create an appointment:

- 1 Tap Start Calendar.
- 2 Tap Menu →New Appointment.
- **3** Enter a name for the appointment, and enter information such as start and end times.

- To schedule an all-day event, in the All Day box, tap Yes.
- When finished, tap **OK** to return to the calendar.

To receive a reminder for an appointment:

- Tap Start → Calendar → Menu → Options → Appointments tab.
- Select the **Set reminders** for new items check box.
- Set the time when you want the reminder to alert you.
- Tap **OK** to return to the calendar.

Using the Summary Screen

When you tap an appointment in Calendar, a summary screen appears. To change the appointment, tap **Edit**.

Creating Meeting Requests

You can use Calendar to set up meetings with users of Outlook or Pocket Outlook. The meeting request is automatically created when you synchronize Messaging or when you connect to your e-mail server. To set how you want meeting requests sent, tap Menu and tap Options.

To schedule a meeting:


- 1 Tap Start →Calendar.
- Schedule a new appointment, or open an existing one and tap Edit.
- 3 Tap Attendees.
- Tap the name of the contact you want to invite.
- To invite each additional attendee, tap **Add** and tap the name.
- Tap **OK**.

The meeting request will be sent to the attendees the next time you synchronize your device with your PC.

For more information on sending and receiving meeting requests, tap Start — Help — Calendar or Messaging.

Contacts

Use Contacts to maintain a list of your friends and colleagues. You can quickly share Contacts information with other device users using the infrared port.



NOTE: To change the way information is displayed in the list, tap **Menu** — **Options**.

To create a contact:

- Tap Start →Contacts →New. 1
- Using the input panel, enter a name and other contact information. 2 Scroll down to see all available fields
- To assign the contact to a category, tap Categories and select a category from the list.
 - In the contact list, you can display contacts by category.

- **4** To add notes, tap the **Notes** tab. You can enter text, draw, or create a recording. For more information on creating notes, see "Notes" on page 93.
- **5** When you have finished entering information, tap **OK** to return to the calendar

Finding a Contact

To find a contact:

- Tap Start →Contacts.
- If you are not in Name view, tap Menu → View By → Name.
- Do one of the following:
 - Begin entering a name or phone number in the provided text box until the contact you want is displayed. To show all contacts again, tap the text box and clear the text, or tap the arrow to the right of the text box.
 - Use the alphabetical index displayed at the top of the contact list.
 - Filter the list by categories. In the contact list, tap Menu Filter. Then tap a category you have assigned to a contact. To show all contacts again, select All Contacts.
- **4** To view the names of companies your contacts work for, tap View in the contact list and tap By Company. The number of contacts that work for that company is displayed to the right of the company name.

Using the Summary Screen

When you tap a contact in the contact list, a summary screen appears. To change the contact information, tap **Edit**.

Tasks

NOTE: To change the way information is displayed in the list, tap **Menu** —**30ptions**.

Use Tasks to list things that you need to do.



To create a task:

- 1 Tap Start → Programs → Tasks.
- **2** Tap New, enter a subject for the task, and fill in information such as start and due dates.
- **3** When finished, tap **OK**.
- 4 To copy an existing task from the task list, select the task you want to copy. Tap Menu Edit Copy, and then tap Menu Edit Paste.
- **5** To add notes, tap the **Notes** tab. You can enter text, draw, or create a recording. For more information on creating notes, see "Notes" on page 93.
- NOTE: To quickly create a task with only a subject, tap Menu →Options →
 Show Tasks entry bar. Tap the Tap here to add a new task, and enter your task information.

Notes

Quickly capture thoughts, reminders, ideas, drawings, and phone numbers with Notes. You can create a written note or a recording. You can also include a recording in a note. If a note is open when you create the recording, it is included in the note as an icon. If a note is not open, the recording is saved as a stand-alone recording.




To create a note:

- **1** Tap Start \rightarrow Programs \rightarrow Notes \rightarrow New.
- **2** Create your note by writing, drawing, typing, or recording. For more information on using the input panel, writing and drawing on the screen, and creating recordings, see "Entering Information" on page 72.

Messaging

Use Messaging to send and receive e-mail messages:

- Synchronize e-mail messages using Exchange or Outlook on your computer.
- Send and receive e-mail messages by connecting directly to an e-mail server through an ISP or a network.



Synchronizing E-Mail Messages

You can synchronize e-mail messages along with the rest of your data if you enable Messaging synchronization in ActiveSync. For information on enabling Messaging synchronization, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.



NOTE: You can also synchronize e-mail messages with your computer from a remote location. For more information, see "Getting Connected" on page 101.

During synchronization:

- Messages are copied from the e-mail folders of Exchange or Outlook on your computer to the ActiveSync folder in Messaging on your device. By default, you receive:
 - Messages from the past 3 days
 - The first 100 lines of each message
 - File attachments of less than 100 KB in size
- E-mail messages in the Outbox folder on your device are transferred to Exchange or Outlook on your computer, and then sent from those programs.
- E-mail messages in subfolders on your computer must be selected in ActiveSync to be transferred.

Connecting Directly to an E-Mail Server

In addition to synchronizing e-mail messages with your computer, you can send and receive e-mail messages by connecting to an e-mail server using a modem or network card connected to your device. You need to set up a remote connection to a network or an ISP, and a connection to your e-mail server. For more information, see "Getting Connected" on page 101.

When you connect to the e-mail server:

- New messages are downloaded to the device **Inbox** folder.
- Messages in the device **Outbox** folder are sent.
- Messages that have been deleted on the e-mail server are removed from the device **Inbox** folder.

Messages that you receive directly from an e-mail server are linked to your e-mail server rather than to your computer. When you delete a message on your device, it is also deleted from the e-mail server the next time you connect, depending on the settings you selected in ActiveSync.

When you are working online, you read and respond to messages while connected to the e-mail server. Messages are sent as soon as you tap Send, which saves space on your device.

After you have downloaded new message headers or partial messages, you can disconnect from the e-mail server and then decide which messages to download completely. The next time you connect, Messaging downloads the messages you have marked for retrieval and sends the messages you have composed.

Using the Message List

Messages you receive are displayed in the message list. By default, the most recently received messages are displayed first in the list.


When you receive a message, tap to open it. Unread messages are displayed in bold

The original messages remain on the e-mail server or your computer. You can mark the messages that you want to retrieve in full during your next synchronization or e-mail server connection. In the message list, tap and hold the message that you want to retrieve. On the pop-up menu, tap Mark for Download. The icons in the Inbox message list indicate message status.

You specify your downloading preferences when you set up the service or select your synchronization options. You can change the settings at any time:

- Change options for Messaging synchronization using ActiveSync options. For more information, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.
- Change options for direct e-mail server connections in Messaging on your device. Tap Menu — Options. On the Account tab, tap the service that you want to change. Tap and hold the service and select **Delete** to remove a service.

Composing Messages



To compose and send a message:

- 1 In the message list, tap Menu —Switch Accounts and select the account.
- 2 Tap New.
- **3** Enter the e-mail address of one or more recipients, separating them with a semicolon. To access addresses and phone numbers from Contacts, tap **To**.
- 4 Enter your message. To quickly add common messages, tap Menu →My Text and tap a desired message.
- 5 To check the spelling, tap Menu → Spell Check.
- 6 Tap Send.

If you are working offline, the message is moved to the **Outbox** folder and sent the next time you connect to the network.

Managing E-Mail Messages and Folders

By default, messages are displayed in one of the five folders for each service you have created: Inbox, Deleted Items, Drafts, Outbox, or Sent Items. The **Deleted Items** folder contains messages that have been deleted on the device. The behavior of the **Deleted Items** and **Sent Items** folders depends on the options you have selected. To change the options, tap Menu →Tools in the message list and tap Options. On the Message tab, select your options.

To create, rename, or delete a folder, tap Menu — Tools — Manage Folders. To move a message to another folder, tap and hold the message in the message list and tap Move to on the pop-up menu.

Folder Behavior With a Direct Connection to an E-Mail Server

The behavior of the folders you create depends on whether you use ActiveSync, POP3, or IMAP4.

- If you use ActiveSync, e-mail messages in the Inbox folder in Outlook are automatically synchronized with your device. You can synchronize additional folders by designating them for ActiveSync. The folders you create and the messages you move are then mirrored on the server. For example, if you move messages from the Inbox folder to a folder named Family, and you have designated Family for synchronization, the server creates a copy of the **Family** folder and copies the messages into that folder. You can then read the messages while away from your computer.
- If you use POP3 and you move e-mail messages to a folder you created, the link is broken between the messages on the device and their copies on the e-mail server. The next time you connect, the e-mail server detects that the messages are missing from the device Inbox and deletes them from the server. This prevents you from having duplicate copies of a message. However, you can access these folder contents from the device only.
- If you use IMAP4, the folders you create and the e-mail messages you move are mirrored on the server. Therefore, messages are available to you any time you connect to your e-mail server, whether it is from your device or computer. This synchronization of folders occurs whenever you connect to the server, create new folders, rename, or delete folders when connected.

Notifications

You can set your device to remind you when you have something to do. For example, if you have set up an appointment in Calendar, a task with a due date in Tasks, or an alarm in Clock, you are notified in one of the following ways:

- A message box appears on the screen
- A sound, which you can specify, plays
- A light flashes on your device

To configure the reminders and sounds for your device:

- Tap Start →Settings. 1
- On the Personal tab, tap Sounds & Notifications.
 - **Sounds** tab Adjust the volume and enable sounds
 - Notifications tab Set notifications for specific events

Beaming an Item

In the Calendar, Contacts, Notes, Tasks, Excel Mobile, Word Mobile, PowerPoint Mobile, and Pictures programs, you can beam files and information to other devices using Bluetooth or infrared.

- From the program, select the item you want to beam, such as an appointment in Calendar, a task in Tasks, a contact card in Contacts, or a file in File Manager.
- Tap Menu Beam [type of item]. 2
- 3 Do one of the following:
 - If using Bluetooth, tap the device to which you want to send the item.
 - If using infrared, align the infrared (IR) ports at close range until the target device name appears, and then tap the device to which you want to send the item.

Using File Explorer

File Explorer lets you browse the folders contents on your device. The root folder is called My Device. My Device is similar to My Computer on the computer and contains My Documents, Program Files, Temp, Storage Card, and Windows folders among others.

To find an item:

- Tap Programs → File Explorer. The My Documents folder and its subfolders appear.
- 2 Tap the folder list (labeled My Documents by default) and tap the folder you want to explore.
- To open an item, tap it.
- To quickly delete, rename, or copy an item, tap and hold the item.
- To select multiple items, tap and drag. Then, tap and hold the selected items, and tap a command.

Getting Connected

You can use your device to exchange information with other mobile devices or with a computer, a network, or the Internet. You can use any of the following connection options:

- Use the infrared (IR) port on your device to send and receive files between two devices. See the following section, "Using Infrared," for more information.
- Connect to your Internet Service Provider (ISP). Once you are connected, you can send and receive e-mail messages using Messaging, and view Web or WAP pages using Internet Explorer Mobile. The communication software for creating an ISP connection is already installed on your device. Your service provider provides the software needed to install other services, such as paging and fax services.
- Connect to the network at the company or organization where you work. Once connected, you can send and receive e-mail messages using Messaging, view Web or WAP pages using Internet Explorer Mobile, and synchronize with your computer.
- Connect to your computer to synchronize remotely. Once you are connected, you can synchronize information such as your Pocket Outlook information. See Microsoft ActiveSync® Help on your computer or Connections Help on the device for more information.

Using Wi-Fi (802.11b)

Wi-Fi provides your device access to WLAN (Wireless Local Area Network.) Short for wireless fidelity, Wi-Fi refers to any type of 802.11 network, whether 802.11b, 802.11a, or dual-band. Wi-Fi certified products from different manufacturers are interoperable.



NOTE: Mid and High configurations of the Axim have Wi-Fi 802.11b built in and the drivers factory installed. For a Low configuration device, you must purchase the 802.11b SD card, insert it in your device, and load the drivers.



NOTE: The default Wireless Networking Client utility for your device is the Dell WLAN utility. The following configuration steps are for the Dell WLAN utility.

Configure wireless networking for your device in one of the following scenarios:

- Network Card is set up
- Wireless Network is broadcasting SSID
- Wireless Network is not broadcasting SSID

If the Network Card is Set Up

Normally the internal wireless card is already set up. There are times when you must choose the network card. On the Axim X50/X50v configurations that have built-in wireless, the network card is associated with the enabled wireless. If wireless is not enabled or you are using a socket card for wireless connection, then choose the network card:

- Tap Start \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Connections. 1
- 2 Tap Network Cards.
- **3** Choose either **Internet** or **Work** from the menu.
- **4** Choose the network card to connect to the network. For the Axim X50/X50v with built-in wireless, choose Dell Axim X50/X50v WLAN Wireless Adapter.
- **5** Choose whether the network card assigns an IP address or receives an IP address automatically.
- Enter the Server IP addresses if required and tap OK.

If the Wireless Network is Broadcasting SSID

- Press the wireless button to enable wireless capability. The green LED in the right top corner of the device indicates that the wireless is functional.
- 2 Tap Start \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Connections.
- **3** To add, edit, or delete a profile, select the corresponding action tap Network Cards.
- In the Configure Wireless Networks window, select one of the available network names and tap OK.

If the Wireless Network is Not Broadcasting SSID

The Configure Wireless Networks window only shows wireless networks that broadcast a Network Name (SSID) and those that have been added. Add the network if it is not listed. Contact your network administrator for the following information:

- SSID (network name)
- Authentication
- Data Encryption
- Keys (if the key is not provided automatically)
- Log in if necessary

To configure the wireless network:

- From the Configure Wireless Networks window, tap Add New.
- Provide the Network Name (SSID).
- Select either Internet or Work in the Connects To box.
 - Selecting Internet allows you to connect to your network but you will have to manually start a VPN connection, if needed.
 - Selecting Work automatically starts a VPN connection any time you connect to the network.
 - If you are having trouble connecting to your network, change the Connects To box to Internet.
- Tap the Network Key tab.
- **5** Enter the Authentication and Data Encryption information. If a key is required, enter the network key.
- Select the 802.1x tab. 6
- The Authentication and Data Encryption chosen on the previous screen determines whether this screen is available. If available choose the EAP type used on the network.
- Tap **OK**.
- If more than one network is listed, tap and hold the stylus on the network name you want to connect to. A pop-up menu appears. Tap Connect. After a few seconds you should see Connected next to the wireless network you selected.

Using Odyssey Client

Odyssey is a wireless LAN access control and security solution that provides strong security over the wireless link. It secures authentication and connection of wireless LAN (WLAN) users, ensuring that only authorized users can connect.

Odyssey is mostly used in place of a manufacturer's wireless networking client such as the Dell WLAN utility, Intel ProSET, or Windows XP's Zero Config Service.

To use Odyssey:

- Tap Start → Settings → Connections Tab → Odyssey Client. The main page appears with the following information:
 - Status of Odyssey
 - Network Name (SSID)
 - Access Point MAC
 - Packet information
- To enable the Odyssev Client tap Settings Enable Odyssev.
- To configure a wireless profile, tap Settings —Configure. This provides you a list of existing profiles and allows you to add, edit, or delete profiles.

Adding a Network

To add a new profile:

- Tap Settings —Configure —Add. The Add Network Wizard window appears.
- Enter the network name, or select the box Any if you want the client to connect to any available network.
- 3 Tap Scan to view all available broadcasted networks. Enter a description if necessary.
- Select between an ad-hoc or infrastructure network. 4
- 5 Tap Next when ready.

- **6** Enter security settings:
 - **Association Mode** allows for open, shared, or WPA association methods.
 - Encryption Method changes based on what mode is chosen. Options include none, WEP, and TKIP.
 - If 802.1x is used, check the box Authenticate using 802.1X.
 - For WPA-PSK, enter your Passphrase (key).
- Depending on your selections, the next page appears. You could be asked to enter a WEP key or username and password.
- Tap Next.
- Here you can select EAP (Extensible Authentication Protocol) methods. Default settings only include EAP / TTLS.
 - If you need other EAP methods, tap Add.
 - After adding other EAP methods, tap **OK**.
 - Tap Next.
- Enter an anonymous name to keep your login name private. This name will be used for outer visible authentication. Tap Next.
- 11 Depending on the EAP method you chose, select an inner authentication protocol. Tap Next.
- 12 Enter username and password and tap Next.
- 13 Tap Finish.
- 14 When done, the new profile is added to the networks to choose from. To select a profile to connect to, tap **OK** in the upper right corner.
- 15 When you return to the **Today** page, there will be a new icon in the systems tray for Odyssey.

Using Cisco® LEAP Wireless LAN Security

Your Dell Axim X50 supports 802.1x network authentication between the client and server with a logon password using Cisco LEAP.

Cisco LEAP can be configured using the Odyssey Client application.

- **NOTE:** Before starting, ensure that the Wireless power is enabled using the Wireless On/Off button.
- **NOTE:** LEAP is not supported on a peer-to-peer network. LEAP is not supported on a low configuration Axim X50.

To start Odyssey Client:

- 1 Tap Start \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Connections \rightarrow Odyssey Client icon.
- 2 Tap Settings →Enable Odyssey.

To start using LEAP:

- **1** Obtain the following information from your network administrator:
 - Network name
 - Association mode
 - Encryption method
- **2** From the Odyssey Client window, tap Settings \rightarrow Configure \rightarrow Add.
- **3** Enter the network name (SSID) if known, or tap **Scan** to search for available Access Points. Tap **Next**.
- **4** LEAP will only support an infrastructure network, so do not change the default settings in the drop-down menu. Tap **Next**.
- **5** Fill in the Association Mode and Encryption method. Tap Next.
- **6 EAP/TTLS** is the default EAP type. Tap **Add** and select **EAP/LEAP** in the window that opens up.
 - Unless you have an authentication certificate to use TTLS and have configured your system to support it, remove EAP/TTLS.
 - **NOTE:** Failure to remove EAP/TTLS when it is not properly set up may prevent your wireless security system from functioning.
- 7 Tap Next.
- **8** Enter your user name and password. Tap Next.
- **9** Tap Finish to complete LEAP configuration.

- **10** Tap OK.
- Select the network that you added from the drop-down menu and tap the box beside Connect to. The status displays as connected (authenticated) when this process is complete.
- **NOTE:** For further details, please refer to the Odyssey Client help file included in your device. You can access the help file at Start —Help —Odyssey Client for Pocket PC or tap Help from the Odyssey Client main screen.

Using Odyssey Client to a Get Certificate of Authority

There are two ways to get certification in Odyssey client:

- Certificate Enroller
- Import User Certificate

Use the Certificate Enroller to install a user certificate using Microsoft Certificate Services. Use Import User Certificate to install the .pfx certificate file stored in the device. To decide the certificate type ask your network administrator

To use the Certificate Enroller:

- Using the Odyssey client, connect to a non 802.1x enabled wireless network on which the certificate server is located.
- 2 Tap Start →Settings →Connections →Odyssey Client.
- 3 Tap Tools →Certificate Enroller.
- Enter the IP address of the certificate server in the **Server** field
- **5** Enter the user name and the domain name in the User name field using the following rule: Domain-name\User-name
- **6** Tap Request.

To use the Import User Certificate:

- **NOTE:** Before you install a certificate, you must know its RSA-type private key password.
 - 1 Tap Start \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Connections \rightarrow Odyssey Client.
 - Tap Tools →Import User Certificate.

- **3** Tap **Browse** to navigate to a **.pfx** file you have stored on your device. Select the file, and tap **OK**.
- **4** Type in the RSA-type private key password for this certificate under **Private key password.** You can optionally click **Unmask** to make this password visible while you type it.
- **5** Tap **Install Certificate** when you are done.

Using Infrared

Infrared is used to send and receive information remotely, such as contacts and appointments, between two devices.

To send information:

- 1 Switch to the program where you created the item you want to send and locate the item in the list.
- **2** Align the infrared sensors so that they are unobstructed and within close range.
- **3** Tap and hold the item, and tap **Beam** *xxxx* on the pop-up menu, where *xxxx* is the item you want to beam.

You can also send items (excluding folders) from File Explorer. Tap and hold the item you want to send, and tap **Beam File** on the pop-up menu.

Using Bluetooth® Wireless Technology

Bluetooth is a wireless technology aimed at simplifying communications between devices and the Internet. It is an open specification for short-range communication of data and voice. For example, it can synchronize data between hand-held devices and other computers.

To configure a device with Bluetooth wireless technology in a Pocket PC environment:

- **1** Ensure that the two devices are turned on, discoverable, and within close range.
- 2 Tap Start →Settings →Connections tab.
- **3** Tap Bluetooth →Devices tab →New Partnership. Your device searches for other Bluetooth devices and displays them in the list.
- **4** Tap the name of the other device, and tap **Next**.

- In the Passkey field, if you want to use a passkey (recommended for enhanced security), enter a alphanumeric passkey between 1 and 16 characters, and tap Next. Otherwise, leave Passkey blank, and tap Next.
- **NOTE:** The Passkey for a remote Bluetooth device is usually found in the user manual for that device. The default Passkey for any Dell Axim is 1234.
 - Enter the same passkey for the other device.
 - **7** Tap Finish.
 - An active connection with Bluetooth wireless technology is created and pairing of the two devices is complete.
- **NOTE:** For more information about using Bluetooth wireless technology, tap Start \rightarrow Help \rightarrow Setting Up Connections.

Creating a Modem Connection

To create a modem connection:

- Install a modem card and appropriate adapters to connect an external modem to your device through the serial port.
- Obtain the following information from your ISP:
 - ISP dial-up access telephone number
 - Username and password
 - TCP/IP settings

Some ISPs require information in front of the username, for example, MSN/username.

- Tap Start →Settings →Connections tab →Connections.
- Under My ISP or My Work Network, tap Add a new modem connection. 4
- Enter a name for the connection, such as ISP Connection.
- From the Select a modem list, select your modem type, and tap Next. If your modem type does not appear, try reinserting the modem card. If you are using an external modem connected to your device with a cable, select Hayes Compatible on COM1. See your modem user guide for details.

- Enter the phone number just the way you would dial it. If you need an area code, be sure to include it. Tap Next.
- Enter your user name, password, and, if applicable, your domain. This information is provided by your ISP or network administrator.
- NOTE: You should not need to change any settings in Advanced. Most ISPs now use a dynamically assigned address.
 - If the ISP you are connecting to does not use a dynamically assigned address, tap Advanced, tap the TCP/IP tab, and then enter the address.
- 10 Tap OK.
- Select other required options and tap Finish. 11

When you open Messaging, Internet Explorer Mobile, or MSN Messenger, your device automatically connects. Once you are connected, you can:

- Send and receive e-mail messages using Messaging. Before you can use Messaging, you need to provide the information that Messaging needs to communicate with the e-mail server. See "Connecting Directly to an E-Mail Server" on page 112 for more information.
- See Web and WAP pages using Internet Explorer Mobile. For more information, see "Using Internet Explorer Mobile" on page 126.
- Send and receive instant messages with MSN Messenger. For more information, see "MSN Messenger" on page 124.


Creating an Ethernet Connection

The term Ethernet refers to the family of LAN products covered by the IEEE 802.3 standard. It defines what is commonly known as the CSMA/CD protocol.

To create an ethernet connection:

- Contact your network administrator to obtain a user name, password, and domain name.
- Install the network card driver, if required. For more information, see the documentation that came with your network card.

- 3 The Network Settings window appears automatically the first time you insert the network card, so that you can configure the network card. To change settings later, tap Start \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Connections tab \rightarrow Connections.
- **4** If you need to enter specific server information, tap the appropriate adapter, and then tap Properties. You may need to enter proxy server and VPN connection settings. For more information, see your network administrator.



If necessary, connect the network card to the network with a network cable. For more information, see the documentation that came with vour network card.

Creating a VPN Connection

A Virtual Private Network (VPN) is constructed using public wires to connect nodes. These systems use encryption and other security mechanisms to ensure that only authorized users can access the network and that data cannot be intercepted.

- Tap Start —Settings —Connections tab —Connections.
- Tap Add a new VPN server connection.
 - NOTE: If you have already created a VPN Server, tap Edit My VPN Servers then tap New.
- Enter a name for the connection.
- In the **Host name/IP** field, enter the VPN server name or IP address. Your network administrator provides you this information.
- Depending on the type of authentication that you want to use with your device, tap **IPSec** or **PPTP** next to **VPN** type.
 - If you are unsure about which option to select, contact your network administrator.
- Tap Next and enter your username, password, and, if required, domain.
- Install the network card driver, if required. For more information, see the documentation that came with your network card.

- 8 Tap Finish.
- To manually start a connection, tap and hold the connection, and tap Connect.



NOTE: A VPN connection requires physical connection to a network. Ensure the unit is linked to a wire or wireless network before you manually start a VPN connection.

Ending a Connection

To disconnect:

- To delete a connection, tap and hold the connection you want to remove, and tap Delete.
- When connected through a cable or cradle, detach your device from the cable or cradle.
- When connected through the infrared sensor, move the device away from the computer.
- When connected through a network (Ethernet) card, remove the card from your device.

Connecting Directly to an E-Mail Server

You can set up a connection to an e-mail server so that you can send and receive e-mail messages using a modem or network connection and Messaging on your device.



NOTE: The ISP or network must use a POP3 or IMAP4 e-mail server and an SMTP gateway.

You can use multiple e-mail services to receive your messages. For each e-mail service you intend to use, you must first set up and name the e-mail service. If you want to use the same service to connect to different mailboxes, set up and name each mailbox connection.

To set up an e-mail service:

- In Messaging on your device, tap Accounts —New Account.
- Follow the directions in the E-mail Setup wizard.

For more information, tap **Start** —**Help**.

To connect to your e-mail server, tap Account — Connect. For more information on using the Messaging program, see "Messaging" on page 94.

Adding and Removing Programs

Some programs are already installed in the ROM when you received your device. You cannot remove these programs or accidentally lose the ROM contents. You can update ROM programs using installation programs with the *.pku extension. You can save data to either ROM or RAM.

You can install any program created for your device, as long as your device has sufficient memory. The most popular place to find software for your device is on the Microsoft[®] Windows Mobile™ Version 5.0 software for Pocket PC Premium Edition website: www.microsoft.com/windowsmobile.

Adding Programs Using Microsoft® Active Sync®

Before installing software on your device, you need to install ActiveSync on your computer. See ActiveSync Help on your computer for more information.

- Determine your device and processor type so that you know which version of the software to install.
 - Tap Start →Settings.
 - On the **System** tab, tap **About**.
 - From the Version tab, record the processor information.
- Download the software to your computer (or insert the Getting Started CD or floppy that contains the software into your computer). You may see a single *.exe, *.zip file, a Setup.exe file, or several versions of files for different device types and processors. Ensure that you select the program designed for the Pocket PC and your device processor type.
- Read any installation instructions, readme files, or documentation that comes with the program. Many programs provide special installation instructions.

- Connect your device to your computer.
- 5 Double-click the *.exe file.

If the file is an installer file, the installation wizard begins. Follow the directions on the screen. Once the software is installed on your computer, the installer automatically transfers the software to your device.

If the file is not an installer file, you receive an error message stating that the program is valid but that it is designed for a different type of computer. You need to move this file to your device. If you cannot find any installation instructions for the program in the readme file or documentation, use ActiveSync Explore to copy the program file to the Program Files folder on your device. For more information on copying files using ActiveSync, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.

To open a program after the installation is complete, tap **Start** —**Programs**, and then tap the program icon.

Downloading Programs From the Internet

- Determine your device and processor type so that you know which version of the software to install:
 - Tap Start →Settings.
 - h On the System tab, tap About.
 - From the Version tab, record the processor information.
- Using Internet Explorer Mobile, download the program to your device. You may see a single *.exe, *.zip file, a Setup.exe file, or several versions of files for different device types and processors. Ensure that you select the program designed for the Pocket PC and your device processor type.
- Read any installation instructions, readme files, or documentation that comes with the program. Many programs provide special installation instructions.

 - Right-click the program and click Create Shortcut. b
 - Move the shortcut to the **Start Menu** folder in the Windows folder. The shortcut now appears on the **Start** menu. For more information, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.

Removing Programs

- Tap Start →Settings.
- Tap System —Remove Programs.
- Tap and hold the name of the program, and tap Delete in the pop-up menu.
 - If the program does not appear in the list of installed programs, use File Explorer on your device to locate the program.

Using Companion Programs

Companion programs include Word Mobile, Excel Mobile, PowerPoint Mobile, and Windows Media Player for Pocket PC.

To use a companion program on your device, tap **Start** —**Programs**, and then tap the program name.

Word Mobile

Word Mobile works with Microsoft Word on your computer to give you easy access to copies of your documents. You can create new documents on your device, or you can copy documents from your computer to your device. Synchronize documents between your computer and your device to have up-to-date content in both locations.

Use Word Mobile to create documents, such as letters, meeting minutes, and travel reports.

To create a new file:

- 1 Tap Start → Programs → Word Mobile.
- 2 Tap New.

A blank document appears. Or, if you selected a template for new documents in the Options dialog box, the template appears with the appropriate text and formatting already provided.



You can open only one document at a time. If you open a second document, you are asked to save the first one. You can create, save, or edit a document in a variety of formats, including Word (.doc), Word template (.dot), Rich Text Format (.rtf), and Plain Text (.txt).

Word Mobile contains a list of the files stored on your device. Tap a file in the list to open it. To delete files, make copies, or send files, tap and hold a file in the list. Then select the appropriate action in the pop-up menu.

You can enter information in Word Mobile by typing, writing, drawing, or recording. These modes appear on the View menu. Each mode has its own toolbar, which you can show and hide by tapping the Show/Hide Toolbar icon on the command bar.

To change the zoom magnification, tap **View**—**Zoom**, and then select the percentage you want. Select a higher percentage to enter text and a lower percentage to see more of your document.

If you are opening a Word document created on a computer, select **Wrap to Window** on the **View** menu, so that you can see the entire document.

Excel Mobile


Excel Mobile works with Microsoft Excel on your computer to give you easy access to copies of your workbooks. You can create new workbooks on your device, or you can copy workbooks from your computer to your device. Synchronize workbooks between your computer and your device, to have up-to-date content in both locations.

Use Excel Mobile to create workbooks, such as expense reports and mileage logs.

To create a new file:

- Tap Start → Programs → Excel Mobile.
- 2 Tap New.

A blank workbook appears. Or, if you selected a template for new workbooks in the Options dialog box, the template appears with the appropriate formulae and formatting already provided.



You can open only one workbook at a time. If you open a second workbook, you are asked to save the first one. You can create, save, or edit a workbook in a variety of formats, including Excel template (.xlt) and Excel (.xls).

Excel Mobile contains a list of the files stored on your device. Tap a file in the list to open it. To delete files, make copies, or send files, tap and hold a file in the list. Then select the appropriate action from the pop-up menu.

Excel Mobile provides fundamental spreadsheet tools, such as formulas, functions, sorting, and filtering. To display the toolbar, tap View → Toolbar.

Tips for Working in Excel Mobile

Use the following tips when working with large worksheets in Excel Mobile:

- Use Full Screen: Tap View Full Screen to see as much of your worksheet as possible. To exit full-screen mode, tap **Restore**.
- Show and hide window elements: Tap View and then tap the elements you want to show or hide.
- Freeze panes on a worksheet: Select the cell where you want to freeze panes. Tap View — Freeze Panes. You might want to freeze the top and leftmost panes in a worksheet, to keep row and column labels visible as you scroll through a sheet.
- Split panes to view different areas of a large worksheet: Tap View Split. Drag the split bar to where you want it. To remove the split, tap View —Remove Split.
- Show and hide rows and columns: To hide a row or column, select a cell in the row or column you want to hide. Tap Menu —Format —Row or Column \rightarrow Hide. To show a hidden row or column, tap Menu \rightarrow Edit —Go To, and then type a reference that is in the hidden row or column. Then tap Menu — Format — Row or Column — Unhide.

For more information on using Excel Mobile, tap Start — Help.

PowerPoint Mobile

PowerPoint Mobile works with Microsoft PowerPoint on your computer to give you easy access to copies of your presentation slides. Many presentation elements built into the slide shows, such as slide transitions and animations, will play back on the device. If the presentation is set up as a timed slide show, one slide will advance to the next automatically. Links to URLs are also supported.

PowerPoint features not supported on the device include:

- **Notes:** Notes written for slides will not be visible.
- **Rearranging or editing slides**: PowerPoint Mobile is a viewer only.

To start a presentation:

- Tap Start → Programs → PowerPoint Mobile.
- In the presentation list, tap the slide show you want to view.
- Tap the current slide to advance to the next slide. If the presentation is set up as a timed slide show, slides will advance automatically.



You can open only one document at a time. If you open a second document, you are asked to save and close the first one. You can view a document in a variety of formats, including PowerPoint (.ppt) and PowerPoint Mobile (.pps).

PowerPoint Mobile contains a list of the files stored on your device. Tap a file in the list to open it. To delete files, make copies, or send files, tap and hold a file in the list. Then select the appropriate action in the pop-up menu.

MSN Messenger

With the MSN Messenger instant message program, you can:

- See who is online.
- Send and receive instant messages.
- Have instant message conversations with groups of contacts.

To use MSN Messenger, you must have a Microsoft Passport account or a Microsoft Exchange e-mail account. You must have a Passport to use MSN Messenger Service. If you have a Hotmail or MSN account, you already have a Passport. Once you have obtained either a Microsoft Passport or a Microsoft Exchange account, you are ready to set up your account.



NOTE: Sign up for a Microsoft Passport account at www.passport.com. Get a free Microsoft Hotmail e-mail address at www.hotmail.com.

To switch to MSN Messenger, tap Start →Programs →Pocket MSN → MSN Messenger.

Setting Up

Before you can connect, you must enter Passport or Exchange account information

To set up an account and sign in:

- Tap Start → Programs → Pocket MSN → MSN Messenger.
- Tap Menu Options.
- 3 Enter your Passport or Exchange account information.
- To sign in, tap the sign-in screen and enter your e-mail address and password.

Working With Contacts

The MSN Messenger window shows all of your messenger contacts at a glance, divided into Online and Not Online categories. From this view, while connected, you can chat, send an e-mail, block the contact from chatting with you, or delete contacts from your list using the pop-up menu.



NOTE: If you already use MSN Messenger on your computer, your contacts show up on your device without having to be added.

To see who is online without them seeing you, tap Menu \rightarrow My Status \rightarrow Appear Offline.

If you block a contact, you appear offline but remain on the blocked contact's list. To unblock a contact, tap and hold the contact, and then tap Unblock on the pop-up menu.

Chatting With Contacts

- Tap a contact name to open a chat window. Enter your message in the text entry area at the bottom of the screen, or tap My Text to enter a preset message, and then tap **Send**.
- To invite another contact to a multiuser chat, tap Menu \rightarrow Chats \rightarrow Invite, and then tap the contact you want to invite.
- To switch back to the main window without closing a chat, tap the Contacts icon. To revert back to your chat window, tap Chats, and select the person with whom you were chatting.
- To know if the contact you are chatting with is responding, look for a message under the text entry area.

For more information on using MSN Messenger, tap **Start** —**Help**.

Microsoft Windows Media® Player for Pocket PC

Use Windows Media Player for Pocket PC to play digital audio and video files that are stored on your device or on a network. To switch to Windows Media Player for Pocket PC, tap **Start** →**Windows Media**.

Use Windows Media Player on your computer to copy digital audio and video files to your Pocket PC. You can play Windows Media and MP3 files on your Pocket PC.

For more information about using Windows Media Player for Pocket PC, tap Start — Help.

Using Internet Explorer Mobile

Use Internet Explorer Mobile to view Web or WAP pages:

- During synchronization with your computer, download your favorite links and mobile favorites that are stored in the Mobile Favorites subfolder in Internet Explorer on your computer.
- Connect to an Internet service provider (ISP) or network and browse the web. For more information on connecting to the Internet, see "Getting Connected" on page 101.

When the device is connected to an ISP or network, you can also download files and programs from the Internet or intranet.

To use Internet Explorer Mobile, tap Start — Internet Explorer.

Mobile Favorites

If you are using Microsoft Internet Explorer 5.0 or later on your computer, you can download mobile favorites to your device. Synchronizing mobile favorites downloads web content to your device, so that you can view pages while you are disconnected from your ISP and computer. Use the Internet Explorer plug-in installed with Microsoft ActiveSync® to create mobile favorites quickly.

To create a mobile favorite on your computer and download it to your device:

- On your computer, open Internet Explorer and click Tools → Create Mobile Favorite.
- 2 To change the link name, enter a new name in the Name box.
- 3 Specify an update schedule next to **Update** (optional).
- Click OK.
 - Internet Explorer downloads the latest version of the page to your computer.
- In Internet Explorer on the computer, right-click the mobile favorite and click Properties.

- 6 In the Download tab, specify the number of levels deep you want to download. To conserve device memory, go only one level deep.
- Synchronize your device and computer. Mobile favorites stored in the **Mobile Favorites** folder in Internet Explorer are downloaded to your device.

If you did not specify an update schedule in step 3, you need to manually download content to keep the information updated on your computer and device. Before synchronizing with your device, click **Tools** in Internet Explorer on your computer and click Synchronize. The date in the **Last Updated** column was the last time content was downloaded to the computer. You can manually download content, if necessary.



NOTE: You can add an icon to the Internet Explorer toolbar for creating mobile favorites. In Internet Explorer on your computer, click View → Toolbars, and then click Customize.

Conserving Memory

Mobile favorites take up storage memory on your device. To minimize the amount of memory used:

- Turn off pictures and sounds or stop some mobile favorites from being downloaded to the device in the Favorites settings in the ActiveSync options. For more information, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.
- Limit the number of downloaded linked pages. In Internet Explorer on the computer, right-click the mobile favorite you want to change and click Properties. On the Download tab, specify 0 or 1 for the number of linked pages you want to download.

Mobile Favorites Folder

Only items stored in the **Mobile Favorites** subfolder (in the **Favorites** folder) in Internet Explorer on your computer are synchronized with your device. The folder was created automatically when you installed ActiveSync.

Favorite Links

During synchronization, the list of favorites in the Mobile Favorites folder on your computer is synchronized with Internet Explorer Mobile on your device. The computer and the device are updated, with changes made to either list, each time you synchronize. Unless you mark the favorite link as a mobile favorite, only the link is downloaded to your device—you need to connect to your ISP or network to view the content. For more information on synchronization, see ActiveSync Help on your computer.

Browsing Mobile Favorites and the Web

You can use Internet Explorer Mobile to browse mobile favorites and channels that you have downloaded to your device without connecting to the Internet. You can also connect to the Internet through an ISP or a network connection and browse the Web.



To view mobile favorites and channels:

- Tap the favorites icon to display your list of favorites.
- Tap the page you want to view.

The page that was downloaded the last time you synchronized with your computer appears. If the page is not on your device, the favorite is dimmed. You need to synchronize with your computer again to download the page to your device, or connect to the Internet to view the page.

To browse the Internet, set up a connection to your ISP or corporate network using Connections, as described in "Getting Connected" on page 101.



NOTE: To add a favorite link, go to the page you want to add, tap and hold the page, and then tap Add to Favorites.

To connect to and browse the Internet, you can either:

- Tap the **Favorites** icon and tap the favorite you want to view.
- In the address field that appears at the top of the Internet Explorer screen, enter the Web address you want and tap the icon to the right, or the down arrow to select previously entered addresses.

Maintenance and Troubleshooting

Maintaining the Axim

To conduct periodic maintenance of your device, use the Dell Axim Self Diagnostic Utility available on the Getting Started CD. This diagnostic utility tests many features of your device: buttons, operating system version, battery status, video play, LED, driver, mirror mode, Bluetooth, Wireless, and USB Link Test

Installing the Diagnostic Utility

To install the utility:

- Create an ActiveSync connection between the device and a computer.
- Insert the Getting Started CD into the computer's CD-ROM drive.
- Click Getting Started →Enhance Your Experience →Tools.
- On the tools selection menu, select Pocket PC Applications.
- Scroll down the list until you see Dell Axim X50/X50v Self-Diagnostic Utility.
- 6 Click Details→Install.
- Follow the instructions on the screen to install the Self-Diagnostic Utility.

To run a diagnostic, tap Start—Programs—Axim Self-Diagnostics.

Troubleshooting

Waiting for GPS signal or no GPS Info in GPS Status Window	 Turn off and then turn on the GPS unit. Check Bluetooth Manager for serial port connection. Use Auto Detect in Navigation software to find correct COM port and Baud Rate. Check GPS unit location - Top of unit must be able to "see" the sky.

What will Dell do?

During the 90 days of the 90-day limited warranty and the first year of all other limited warranties: During the 90 days of the 90-day limited warranty and the first year of all other limited warranties, we will repair any Dell-branded hardware products returned to us that prove to be defective in materials or workmanship. If we are not able to repair the product, we will replace it with a comparable product that is new or refurbished.

When you contact us, we will issue a Return Material Authorization Number for you to include with your return. You must return the products to us in their original or equivalent packaging, prepay shipping charges, and insure the shipment or accept the risk if the product is lost or damaged in shipment. We will return the repaired or replacement products to you. We will pay to ship the repaired or replaced products to you if you use an address in Canada. Otherwise, we will ship the product to you freight collect.

If we determine that the problem is not covered under this warranty, we will notify you and inform you of service alternatives that are available to you on a fee basis.

NOTE: Before you ship the product(s) to us, make sure to back up the data on the hard drive(s) and any other storage device(s) in the product(s). Remove any confidential, proprietary or personal information, removable media, such as floppy disks, CDs, or PC Cards. We are not responsible for any of your confidential, proprietary or personal information; lost or corrupted data; or damaged or lost removable media.

During the remaining years following the first year of all limited warranties: We will replace any defective part with new or refurbished parts, if we agree that it needs to be replaced. When you contact us, we will require a valid credit card number at the time you request a replacement part, but we will not charge you for the replacement part as long as you return the original part to us within 30 days after we ship the replacement part to you. If we do not receive the original part within 30 days, we will charge to your credit card the then-current standard price for that part.

We will pay to ship the part to you if you use an address in Canada. Otherwise, we will ship the part freight collect. We will also include a prepaid shipping container with each replacement part for your use in returning the replaced part to us.

NOTE: Before you replace parts, make sure to back up the data on the hard drive(s) and any other storage device(s) in the product(s). We are not responsible for lost or corrupted data.

What if I purchased a service contract?

If your service contract is with Dell, service will be provided to you under the terms of the service contract. Please refer to that contract for details on how to obtain service. If you purchased through us a service contract with one of our third-party service providers, please refer to that contract (mailed to you with your packing slip or invoice) for details on how to obtain service.

How will you fix my product?

We use new and refurbished parts made by various manufacturers in performing warranty repairs and in building replacement parts and systems. Refurbished parts and systems are parts or systems that have been returned to Dell, some of which were never used by a customer. All parts and systems are inspected and tested for quality. Replacement parts and systems are covered for the remaining period of the limited warranty for the product you bought. Dell owns all parts removed from repaired products.

May I transfer the limited warranty?

Limited warranties on systems may be transferred if the current owner transfers ownership of the system and records the transfer with us. The limited warranty on Dell-branded memory may not be transferred. You may record your transfer by going to Dell's website:

"Total Satisfaction" Return Policy (Canada Only)

If you are an end-user customer who bought new products directly from Dell, you may return them to Dell up to 30 days after you receive them for a refund or credit of the product purchase price. If you are an end-user customer who bought reconditioned or refurbished products from Dell, you may return them to Dell within 14 days after the date on the packing slip or invoice for a refund or credit of the product purchase price. 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Glossary

802.11 (WI-FI) — A wireless technology standard for mid-range networking devices that allows for enabled devices to automatically recognize each other.

BLUETOOTH® WIRELESS TECHNOLOGY — A wireless technology standard for short-range (10 m [30 ft]) networking devices that allows for enabled devices to automatically recognize each other.

COMPACTFLASH CARD — A removable card that is used to expand the capabilities of a device. Common types of CompactFlash cards include memory and wireless cards.

CRADLE — A device that allows your handheld device to synchronize with a computer, recharge its battery, and run on AC power.

DHCP — dynamic host configuration protocol — A communication protocol that allows network administrators to manage and automate the assignment of Internet Protocol addresses to computers in a network.

IMAP — Internet message access protocol — A standard client/server protocol that allows you to access your e-mail from your device. Using IMAP, you can store and browse your e-mail on the ISP's server.

INFRARED SENSOR — A port that allows you to transfer data between the computer and infrared-compatible devices without using a cable connection.

ISP — Internet service provider — A company that allows you to access its host server to connect directly to the Internet, send and receive e-mail, and access websites. The ISP typically provides you with a software package, username, and access phone numbers for a fee.

LAN — local area network — A computer network covering a small area. A LAN usually is confined to a building or a few nearby buildings. A LAN can be connected to another LAN over any distance via telephone lines and radio waves to form a wide area network (WAN).

PIM — personal information manager — A program that stores and organizes your personal information, such as Calendar, Contacts, Messaging, and Tasks.

POP3 — post office protocol 3 — A standard client/server protocol that allows you to access your e-mail on the ISP's server. Using POP3, you must download your e-mail to your device to view and browse your messages.

RAM — random-access memory — The primary temporary storage area for program instructions and data. Any information stored in RAM is lost when you perform a reset.

RAS — remote access server — A type of server that allows users to access a network from a remote location.

- SERIAL CONNECTOR An I/O port often used to connect devices such as a handheld digital device or digital camera to your computer.
- **SMS** short message service A service that is capable of sending short messages to wireless devices.
- **SMTP** simple mail transfer protocol A type of protocol used for sending and receiving e-mail. SMTP is typically coupled with POP3 or IMAP.
- **SYNC CABLE** A cable through which you can connect a handheld device to a computer to transfer or synchronize files.
- **SYNCHRONIZATION** An automated process that replaces the files in one location with the most updated files from another location. For example, you can synchronize the files on your computer with the files on your handheld device.
- **TCP/IP** transmission control protocol/Internet protocol The basic communication language of the Internet. TCP/IP can also be used as a communication protocol in an intranet or extranet.
- **USB** universal serial bus A hardware interface for a low-speed device such as a USB-compatible keyboard, mouse, joystick, scanner, set of speakers, printer, broadband devices (DSL and cable modems), imaging devices, or storage devices. Devices are plugged directly into a 4-pin socket on your computer or into a multiport hub that plugs into your computer. USB devices can be connected and disconnected while the computer is turned on, and they can also be daisy-chained together.
- **VPN** virtual private network A set of communication protocols that allows remote users to securely access a network.
- **WAP** wireless application protocol A standardization for the way that wireless devices access the Internet.

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
