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Overview

The Dell Repository Manager (RM) allows you to create repositories of customized bundles and updates, and groups of related updates for systems running supported Microsoft Windows or Linux operating systems. This facilitates generation of comparison reports and establishing update baselines of repositories. The customized bundles and repositories are made up of Dell Update Packages (DUPs) based on operating systems supported, update types, form factor and line of business. DUPs are software utilities provided by Dell to update specific software components on Dell PowerEdge systems, Dell desktops, and Dell laptops. By using RM, you can ensure that your Dell PowerEdge system, Dell desktop or Dell laptop is equipped with the latest BIOS, driver, firmware, and software updates. The DUPs are modified periodically to indicate the latest updates for your systems. You can arrange these components in bundles to group the related updates together. Every repository has a catalog.xml or catalog.cab file that specifies the contents of a repository.

You can deploy the repository through bootable ISO images, raw driver packs, deployment scripts, or Server Update Utilities (SUU).

RM can run in two modes — Server and Client.

Key Features

Table 1-1. Key Features of RM

Feature	Description
RM in Server and Client mode	In the Server mode, all the export options and tabs are available while editing a repository. In the Client mode, only features relevant to the client repository are available.
Customize repositories for Dell Client System Update (DCSU) and Dell Client Manager (DCM)	In the Client mode, you can customize repositories for DCM and DCSU applications.
Customized repository and bundle management	Create customized repositories and bundles using the graphical user interface (GUI). These customized repositories consist of organized sets of hardware updates such as: drivers, firmware, BIOS, and other applications that apply to your system. The Dell FTP site serves as the source location for the repositories. Export custom respositories by downloading the files, from the Dell FTP site.
Extensive search capability	A search and filter mechanism that allows you to filter components and bundles based on operating systems, platforms, devices, form factor, and criticality while creating repositories and bundles.
Deployment of customized repositories and bundles	Create customized deployment media for pre-OS update deployment of Linux DUPs or SUU for post-OS update deployment, raw driver packs, deployment packs, and custom SUU using the bundles of your customized repository that can be deployed on any Dell system running Microsoft Windows or Linux operating system.
Installation and notification of the latest version of Deployment Media	In the Server mode, while exporting bundles in the ISO format, RM installs the latest available version of Deployment Media. You must approve the update for installing it on your system.

Feature	Description
Display of disclaimer when a Dell– recommended bundle is modified	In the Server mode, when you modify a Dell–recommended bundle by modifying its attributes such as name and version or remove components, a disclaimer prompting you to test the bundle before deploying it appears.
Seamless environment management and deployment	Use RM on any system (desktop, laptop, or server running a supported operating system) to create custom repositories of bundles or update packages. The custom repositories created can then be used by many tools to deploy updates to Dell PowerEdge systems.
Sort feature for bundles and components	In the Bundles tab, you can sort the list of bundles based on name of the bundle, version, operating system, date on which the bundles were created, size, and author of the bundles. In the Components tab, you can sort the list of components based on file name, type, version, criticality, and date on which the component was created.
Command line options to launch RM	You can also use command line options to launch RM.
Compatible with languages supported by OpenManage products	RM runs on Windows operating systems where the language is set to any international language supported by OpenManage products. The languages are:

Clear depiction of Dell and user recommended bundles in the Bundles tab	In the Author column, the Dell recommended bundles are indicated as "DELL" and customized bundles as "User".

Indication of the size of the selected Bundles /Components *	The size of the Bundles or Components you select in the Bundles/Components screen, is indicated at the top of the lists on the Bundles/Components screen.
Digital certificate publisher alert and prompt for acceptance	When you download a Catalog.cab file or an individual Dell update package from ftp.dell.com, RM verifies the Dell digital signature and prompts you to accept the certificate publisher. If the verification fails, RM does not download the file or package and displays an error message.
Display of the size and number of files	When you save a repository, the size and number of files downloaded are displayed in a window.
downloaded **	A new column, Size , is included in the Bundles and Components screens to indicate the size of the Bundles and Components that are available in a repository.
Deployment media and SUU plugin update feature	A plugin icon is provided on the top right-hand corner on the Repository Manager screen to display and update deployment media and SUU plugins. The feature also enables you to copy the plugins to a location on your system.
Advanced Logging Support *	An advanced logging system is provided to store all error messages.

Driver Pack filter for components, in the Server mode	In the Server mode of RM, a new filter — Driver Packs, has been included to search for PowerEdge maintenance driver packs and Unified Server Configurator (USC) driver packs, released by Dell.

User Scenarios

Launching RM Using Command Line Options

To launch RM using the command line options, use:

- RepositoryManager.exe <path> to load a specific repository at start up.
- RepositoryManager.exe -server to launch the application in Server mode.


or

RepositoryManager.exe -client to launch the application in Client mode.

Managing RM

To manage RM, after it is installed, by repairing it:

- 1 Double-click the *Repository Manager.msi* located on your system.
- 2 On the Dell Repository Manager InstallShield Wizard, click Next.



3 To repair the installation errors, select the **Repair** option. For more information, see Repairing Repository Manager.

Upgrading to the Latest Version of RM

To upgrade an earlier version of the RM that is installed on your system:

- 1 Download the Repository Manager.msi file from support.dell.com.

 - PCI Device Information
 - Driver Packs
 - **NOTE:** The **Driver Packs** filter for components is available only in the Server mode.

Repairing Repository Manager

RM facilitates repair of errors such as missing or corrupt files and shortcuts, and registry entries that occur while installing the application.

To repair the installation errors:

- 1 Double-click the Repository Manager.msi located on your system.
- 2 In the Dell Repository Manager InstallShield Wizard, click Next.
- **3** Select **Repair** and click **Next**.
- 4 In the Ready to Repair the Program, click Install.
- **5** Click **Finish**. The repaired RM is installed on your system.

Uninstalling Repository Manager

To uninstall, depending on your operating system, do the following:

On Windows XP and Windows Server 2003

To uninstall RM on a system running Windows XP and Windows Server 2003:

- 1 From the Start menu, click Settings→ Control Panel→ Add or Remove Programs.
- 2 Select Dell Repository Manager, and click Remove.
- **3** Click **Yes** to confirm.

On Windows Vista, Windows Server 2008, Windows 2008 R2, and Windows 7

To uninstall RM from Windows Server 2008, Windows 2008 R2, and Windows 7:

- 1 From the Start menu, click Control Panel→ Programs and Features.
- 2 In Programs and Features, select Dell Repository Manager, and click Uninstall.
- **3** Click **Yes** to confirm.

Creating a New Repository

To create a repository:

- Launch RM.
- 2 In the Welcome window, click Import a Repository.

If the Welcome window is closed, you can click the Open link on the **Repository** Manager screen to add a repository.

If you click Import Repository, the Load Repository Manager window appears with the status of the remote repository download process. For more information, see Importing an Existing Repository.



NOTE: The **Repository Manager Plugin Notification Settings** window appears after the catalog is downloaded, when you launch RM for the first time. For more information, see Configuring the New Plugin Notification Settings.

- 3 In the Create/Load Repository window, select Create New Repository, and click Next.
- **4** Enter the Name: and Description: and click Next.
- **5** Select a source for your repository, and click **Next**. For more information on selecting a source, see Selecting a Source for the Repository.
- **6** Select the desired form factor for your repository, and click **Next**. The system models are displayed based on the form factor you select. For example, if you select **Tower**, all system models pertaining to tower systems are displayed.
- 7 In the Select Operating System(s) window, select the operating system whose components you want to include in the repository, and click Next. For more information on selecting operating systems, see Selecting Operating Systems.
- **8** Select a system model, and click **Next**. For more information on selecting system models, see Selecting System Models.
- **9** In the Select Bundle(s) window, select the bundle(s) you want to include in the repository, and click Next. For more information on selecting bundle(s), see Selecting Bundles.

10 In the Additional Component(s) window, click Yes if you want your repository to include additional components not included in the bundle(s) you selected. Click View Components for a list of additional components, and click Next.

You can view the bundle(s) and components in this repository from the Bundles and Components tabs.

NOTE: The filter used on bundle(s) are used on the additional components

- The Summary window displays the properties of the repository based on your selections in the RM.
- **12** Click Finish to create the new repository. The number of bundle(s), components, and unassigned components added to the repository appear in a window.
- 13 Click the Save icon on the Repository Manager screen to save the repository in the catalog file, in the xml or cab format, and all update packages on your system.

The **Repository Saved** window appears with the following message:

"Download completed successfully"

The name of the repository, the path where the repository is saved appear in the window. The size and number of the bundle(s) downloaded, and the number of the component files downloaded also appear in the window.

The saved repository comprises catalogs and packages defined in it. It also includes the inventory collector.



NOTE: You can customize the filename of the repository while saving it.



NOTE: Ensure that the bundle(s) and components you add to the repository belong to the specified criteria. RM does not restrict you from adding components that do not belong to the specified criteria into the repository.

Selecting a Source for the Repository

You can select a source for the repository you want to create, in the **Select Source Repository** window.

Select one of the options listed in Table 4-2.

Table 4-2. Repository Sources

Options	Details
Empty Repository	Creates an empty repository. You can add bundle(s) and components to the new repository. For information on adding bundle(s), see Importing Bundles.
(Server) ftp.dell.com	Imports the default repository. This option is enabled only if you have access to the Internet. You can import the bundle(s) and components from this repository into the repositories you create. For more information, see Importing an Existing Repository.
Local Repository	Selects an existing repository as a base repository and then add bundle(s) to the base repository.
Recent Repository	Lists the recent repositories that were created or imported using RM. Select one of these repositories as the base repository, and click Next. In the Select Form Factor window, select the type of Dell systems that you want to include in your repository and click Next. Dell systems can be classified into racks (monolithic), towers (monolithic), and blades (modular) systems.

- If you select Empty Repository and click Next,
 - The Summary window is displayed. Click Finish to create the empty repository.
- If you select (Server) ftp.dell.com, Local Repository, or Recent Repository and, click Next,
 - Selected repository is loaded and the Select Form Factor window is displayed.
 - Select the type of Dell system(s) that you want to include in your repository and click Next. Dell systems can be classified into racks (monolithic), towers (monolithic), and blades (modular) systems.

Selecting Operating Systems

You can select one or more operating systems for the repository you want to create, in the Select Operating System(s) window.

Select one of the options listed in Table 4-3.

Table 4-3. Operating Systems

Options	Details
All Operating Systems	Allows to select component(s) pertaining to all the Windows and Linux operating systems supported by RM, and the components that are independent of an operating system.
Windows	Allows to select component(s) pertaining to the Windows operating systems supported by RM.
Linux	Allows to select component(s) pertaining to the Linux operating systems supported by RM.
Other	Allows to select component(s) that are independent of an operating system.

Selecting System Models

You can select a system model for the repository you want to create, in the Select System Model(s) window.

Select one of the options listed in Table 4-4.

Table 4-4. System Models

Options	Details
Include All	Includes Dell Update Packages (DUPs) for all available systems based on the form factor you selected, in your repository. For example, if you selected Tower as the form factor, selecting Include All includes DUPs of all the Dell tower system(s) in the repository.

Table 4-4. System Models (continued)

Options	Details
Select Model(s)	Displays all the available systems based on the form factor you selected. You can select individual or multiple systems as required from the list box. For example, if you select Tower as the form factor, selecting Select Model(s) displays all the Dell tower systems. You can then choose the tower system(s) whose DUPs you want to include in the repository.

Selecting Bundles

A bundle is a collection of DUPs that contain information about related components to be updated for that system. Select one of the following to add a bundle to the repository you want to create:

- ONLY include most recent and custom bundle(s) Includes recently released and customized bundle(s) in the repository.
- **Select Bundle(s)** Allows to select bundle(s) from the list displayed.

Importing an Existing Repository

To import an existing repository:

- 1 Launch RM.
- 2 In the Welcome window, click Import a Repository. If the Welcome window is closed, click the Open link located at the top of the Repository Manager screen to add a repository.
 - If you click Import Repository, the Load Repository Manager window appears with the status of the remote repository download process.
- 3 In the Create/Load Repository window, select Load Existing Repository and click Next.



NOTE: When a **Catalog.cab** or individual update package is downloaded, RM verifies the Dell digital signature for the files. If the verification fails, the downloaded file is discarded and an error message is displayed.

After the repository is downloaded, RM fetches the size of the individual bundle(s) and components. However, if you skip the size fetching process, a link — Get Size appears in the Size column corresponding to every bundle and component. Click the link to fetch the size of the files.

- In the Select Source Repository window:
 - Select (Server) ftp.dell.com to import a repository from ftp.dell.com.
 - **NOTE:** You cannot edit bundle(s) and components contained in the repository stored on ftp.dell.com. Therefore, the Add, Save, and Remove buttons on the Bundles and Components tabs are disabled while viewing the ftp repository.
 - Select Local Repository to import a repository stored on your system. Click Browse to specify the location of the local repository.
 - Select Recent Repositories to view and import one of the recent repositories that you created or imported using RM.

Click Next

In the **Summary** window, click **Finish**.

The name of the repository, the number of bundle(s), components, and unassigned components added to the repository appear in the Repository created screen.

You can view the bundle(s) and components in this repository from the Bundles and Components tabs.

Comparing Repositories

You can compare the difference between repositories you created or imported (the base repository), with other available repositories (comparison repositories).

To compare repositories, on the top of the Repository Manager screen, click the Compare link.



NOTE: You must create or import at least two repositories to use the Compare feature.

Table 4-5 below lists the options in the Comparison Options window.

Table 4-5. Compare Repositories Window - Options

Field	Description
Base Repository	Select the initial repository that you want to use for comparison.
Comparison Repository	Select the repository with which you want to compare your base repository.
Newer Versions	Select to view newer version of the same components in the comparison repository.
Changed Files	Select to view any component files that have changed in the comparison repository.
Updates to Remove	Select to view the component updates identified for removal from the base repository.
Updates to Add	Select to view the component updates identified for addition to base repository.

Click View Report. The comparison report for the selected repositories appears in the Comparison Report window.

Comparison Report

The comparison report displays newer versions, added releases, and changed releases available in the comparison repository. You can update your base repository with the components displayed in the comparison report:

- Newer Versions tab —Select the file and click Update to update the base repository with newer versions of the components.
- Changed Files tab —Select the file and click Replace to replace the component in the base repository.
- Updates to Remove tab —Select the file and click Remove to remove a component from the base repository.
- Updates to Add tab —Select the file and click Add to add a component from the comparison repository to the base repository.

Saving the Repository

Repositories can be saved as:

- entire repositories including the catalog and the packages defined in it —
 For more information, see Creating a New Repository.
- catalog only For more information, see Saving the Catalog.

Saving the Catalog

You can save the **catalog.xml** or **catalog.cab** file, which contain details of the repository you created or customized, to your local system.

To save the catalog:

- 1 On the Repository Manager screen, click the Save icon.
- 2 In the Save Repository window, select Catalog file only.
- **3** In the **Save repository to:** text box, browse to the location where you want to save the repository.
- 4 Select Change base location in catalog XML, if required.

Select **ftp.dell.com** to choose it as the base location for the **Catalog.xml** file. The files and components to be included in the repository are downloaded from this location.

Select the empty text box option and enter the path of the location on your system which you want to choose as the base location for the catalog.XML file.

5 Click Save.

When a repository is saved, the size and number of files downloaded are displayed in the following format:

```
<size> bytes downloaded
```

<number of files> out of <total number of files>
downloaded.

When a catalog is being saved, the following message is displayed:

- "Catalog save successful"
- "Catalog successfully saved to: <path where the repository is saved>"
- **6** Click Close to return to the Repository Manager screen.

Editing a Repository

You can only edit the name and description of a selected repository, if the repository is editable.

To edit a repository:

- Select the repository you want to edit.
- Click the **Details** link at the top of the **Repository Manager** screen.
- **3** In the Repository Details window, edit the name or description and click Apply Changes.

Removing a Repository

You can remove repositories you do not use from RM.

To remove a repository:

- To remove a repository from RM, select the repository, and click the Remove link at the top of the Repository Manager screen.
- 2 In the Save Confirmation window, click Yes to save the repository in your system before removing it. The RM saves the repository in your system but does not display it in the drop-down list. Click **No** to remove the repository without saving it.



NOTE: Removing a repository will remove the repository only from the application and not from your system.

Working With Bundles

A bundle is a collection of Dell Update Packages (DUPs), called components, that are related to a certain platform, for example, PowerEdge R410 and operating system, for example, Microsoft Windows 2003.

You can use RM to:

- Create or import and customize bundle(s). For more information, see Creating Custom Bundles.
- Clone existing bundle(s). For more information, see Cloning Bundles.
- Compare bundle(s). For more information, see Comparing Bundles.
- Export bundle(s) to external repositories or deploy them to applicable systems in the form of Linux ISOs, deployment packs, INF files, or a fully functional Server Update Utility (SUU).

The list of bundle(s), you create or import, appear in the **Bundles** tab. You can sort the list of bundle(s) based on name of the bundle, version, operating system, date on which the bundle(s) were created, size, and author of the bundle(s).

You can view the number of bundle(s) in the list and the number of bundle(s) you select, at the top of the list. The numbers are displayed in the format: <Selected/Total>.

You can also view the total size of the bundle(s) you select at the top right-hand corner of the list. The size is displayed in MB or GB.

You can check for updates to the Deployment Media/SUU plug-in packages and download the new payload. The Deployment Media plugin enables the RM to generate new bootable ISOs, with Linux DUPs, that will update the pre-OS BIOS and firmware. The SUU plugin enables RM to generate an ISO, with Windows and Linux DUPs, for post-OS updates. For more information, see Downloading SUU and Deployment Media Plugins.

Viewing the Size of Bundles

In the **Bundles** tab, you can view the size of all the bundle(s) you select in the repository, at the top of the bundle(s) list. The size is displayed in MB or GB.

You can also view the size of individual bundle(s) in the Size column, in the bundle(s) list.

To view the size of a bundle, click the **Get Size** link corresponding to the bundle.



NOTE: The **Get Size** link is displayed only for bundle(s) for which the size is not fetched while the repository is loaded.

Creating Custom Bundles

You can create a custom bundle, and then import components to that bundle.

To create a bundle:

- 1 Load the repository in which you want to create the custom bundle, or create a new repository.
- **2** Click the **Bundles** tab.
- Click Add.
- 4 In the Import Bundle(s) window, click Next.
- 5 In the Import Options window, click Manually create a bundle. Click Next.
- 6 In the Name and Version window, enter a name and version for your bundle. Select the operating system this bundle applies to, and click Next.
- 7 In the Select Operating System window, select one of the following and click Next:
 - Select all Operating Systems
 - Select specific Operating Systems



NOTE: This option is available only when the selected **OS Type** is "Windows" or "Linux".

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8 In the Select Platforms window, select the required platform(s) required, and click Next

The Import Summary window displays the properties of the custom bundle you created.

9 Click Finish

The custom bundle is added under the list of bundle(s) on the **Bundles** tab. Custom bundle(s) you create are indicated by 'User' in the Author column and Dell default bundle(s) are indicated by 'DELL'.



NOTE: You cannot add components to a bundle if the components are not compatible with the operating system or platform associated with the bundle(s).

Importing Bundles

To import a bundle:

- Create or import a repository.
- 2 Click the **Bundles** tab
- Click Add.
- **4** In the **Import Bundle(s)** window, click **Next**.
- 5 In the Import Options window, select one of the following, and click Next.
 - Import bundle(s) from an existing repository Imports bundle(s) already present in an existing repository
 - Manually create a bundle. Creates a custom bundle. For more information on creating a bundle manually, see Creating Custom Bundles.
- 6 In the Select Source Repository window, select one of the following repository location that contains the bundle(s) you want:
 - (Server) ftp.dell.com
 - Local Repository
 - Recent Repository list

Click Next.

- 7 In the Select Form Factor window, select the form factor of the systems associated with the bundle you want to import, and click Next. For example, if you want to import the bundle for a tower system, select Tower.
- **8** In the Select Operating System(s) window, select one of the following, and click Next.
 - All Operating Systems Select components pertaining to all the Windows and Linux operating systems supported by RM
 - Windows Select DUPs applicable to Windows
 - Linux Select DUPs applicable to Linux
 - Other Select DUPs independent of an operating system
- **9** In the Select System Model(s) window, select one of the following, and click Next.
 - Include All Includes DUPs for all available systems
 - Select Model(s) Includes DUPs only for the systems selected from the list
- 10 In the Select Bundle(s) window, select the bundle(s) you want to include in the repository. Select ONLY include most recent and custom bundle(s) to include manually created bundle(s) and the most recently used bundle(s).

Click Next.

11 The Import Summary window displays a list of bundle(s) based on the criteria you specified. Click Finish to import the bundle(s).

Removing Bundles

To remove a bundle.

- 1 On the **Bundles** tab select the bundle you want to remove.
- Click Remove.

The following message appears:

"Do you want to remove the selected bundle(s)?"

3 Click **Yes** to proceed.

Cloning Bundles

You can create an exact copy of an existing bundle, and specify a new name and version for the copy.

To clone a bundle:

- 1 On the **Bundles** tab, select a bundle you want to copy from the list of displayed bundle(s), and click Clone.
- 2 In the Clone Bundle window, the Bundle Name field displays the bundle that you selected to be copied or cloned.
- **3** In the New Name field, enter a name for the cloned bundle.
- **4** In the Version field, enter a version number for the cloned bundle.
- Click OK.

Comparing Bundles

You can compare bundle(s), view and compare the DUPs that have changed in the bundle(s) you selected.

To compare bundle(s):

- 1 On the Bundles tab select the bundle you want to compare. This is the base bundle.
- Click Compare.
- 3 In the Compare Bundles window, select a repository that contains the bundle with which you want to compare the base bundle, from the Repository drop-down list.
- The **Bundles** list box displays the bundle(s) contained in the repository you selected. Select the bundle(s) you want to compare with the base bundle



NOTE: The **Bundles** list box displays bundle(s) from the selected repository based on the base bundle. If you select a Linux bundle as the base bundle, then Linux bundle(s) are displayed. If you select a Windows bundle as the base bundle, then Windows bundle(s) are displayed.

- **5** Select Newer Versions to view newer versions of the components in the bundle(s) you selected.
- **6** Select Changed Files to view component files that have changed in the selected bundle(s).

- 7 Select Updates to Add to view updates that are present in the comparison bundle but not in the base bundle.
- **8** Select **Updates to Remove** to view updates that are present in the base bundle but not in the comparison bundle.
- **9** Click Compare to view the comparison report for the selected bundle(s) based on the criteria you specified.
- **10** You can also click **Comparison Report** to save the report as a HTML file and view it in a Web browser

Exporting Bundles

You can export a bundle to an existing repository as deployment media or an INF file, or light-weight deployment packs, or SUU, and use it to update applicable systems.

To export bundle(s):

- Click the Bundles tab.
- **2** Select the bundle(s) you want to export from the list of displayed bundle(s) and click **Export**.
- **3** In the Export Bundle(s) window, click Next.
- 4 Select the destination of export for the selected bundle(s), and click Next. For more information, see Selecting a Destination for Bundle Exports and Exporting as a SUU.
 - If you select the Raw Driver Pack (Using Windows Bundle) Extract driver files (.INF) from bundles or Export to light weight deployment scripts options, the Browse for Folder window is displayed.
- **5** In the Browse for Folder window, select the location on your system where you want to store the exported bundle.
 - In the **Select Repository** window, click **Add** to select repositories to which you want to export the bundle.
 - In the **Export Summary** window, the details about the bundle(s) selected for export and the destination properties appear.

6 Click Finish to complete the export. The following message is displayed: "Bundles exported successfully"

7 Click OK.

To export bundle(s) on a shared network using deployment script, raw driver pack, deployment media, and SUU:

- prior to the export, map the shared network
- during the export, point the mapped shared network as the destination location

Selecting a Destination for Bundle Exports

You can select an export destination for the bundle(s) in the Export Destination window.

Table 4-6 lists the options in the **Export Destination** window.

Table 4-6. Export Destination

Options	Details
Export to Repository	Exports the bundle(s) to a repository. You can choose to export to an existing repository or create a new repository. If you select the Export as NEW Repository option, RM creates a repository containing only the bundle(s) you selected.
Raw Driver Pack (Using Windows Bundle)	Exports the bundle(s) as INF files. You can use these INF files to update applicable systems. This option is applicable to only those bundle(s) that contain driver updates for the supported Microsoft Windows operating system.
	NOTE: Bundle(s) containing Linux components are skipped during the export process. Only bundle(s) containing INF/SYS files are exported.
	For every exported bundle(s), a folder is created with the name of the bundle(s). Navigate to the required bundle folder and run .bat file to apply the drivers on the system.

deployment scripts Select a location to save the scripts for bundle(s) pertain the .bat format and Linux is run the .bat and .sh scripts	Exports the bundle(s) in the form of deployment scripts. Deployment Media (Using Linux Bundle)	Updates the system irrespective of the operating system installed on them. It can be used to update systems that do not have an operating system installed.
	The Deployment Media option exports the bundle(s) as ISO images. You can burn these ISO images to a CD and boot the CD, or create a bootable USB key on the systems that you want to update with the latest bundle(s). This option is available for deployment only if you select Linux custom bundle(s).
	This ISO image uses Deployment Media Linux Kernel to execute the DUPs and update the system.
	If the deployment media(ISO) is created using multiple base lines (bundle(s)), all the base lines are displayed on the console when you boot the server through the media. Export as SUU	Exports a selected Dell recommended or custom bundle as a fully functional SUU. For more information, see Exporting as a SUU.

Exporting as a SUU

You can export a selected Dell recommended or a custom bundle as a fully functional SUU.

To export a Dell recommended or a custom bundle as a functional SUU:

- **1** Load or import a repository.
- **2** Click the **Bundles** tab.
- **3** Select the bundle(s) you want to export from the list of displayed bundle(s), and click **Export**.
- 4 In the Export Bundle(s) window, select Export as SUU, and select one of the following, and click Next.
 - Export as SUU to Directory to create a SUU pack in the provided directory.
 - Export as SUU to ISO to create an ISO image of the SUU pack.

The system checks for availability of the latest SUU plugin. If a plugin is available, the version number of the plugin appears and the application prompts you to proceed with the exporting process.

For more information on the usage of SUU on Windows and Linux servers, see the *Dell OpenManage Server Update Utility User's Guide* at support.dell.com/manuals.

- **5** In the Browse For Folder window, navigate to the folder on your local drive, where you want to export the SUU, and click **OK**.
 - While RM checks for the latest version of SUU plugin is in progress,
 Checking to see if the required plugin is installed... is displayed.
 - If the latest plugin is already downloaded the following message appears:
 - "Required plugin found"

The version number of the plugin found is also displayed.

 When ftp.dell.com is accessible and, latest plugins exist on your system, the Update plugin link is displayed. When you click the link, the plugins from the system are updated.

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If you attempt installing plugins by clicking the Click here to install the plugin, when ftp.dell.com is not accessible and plugins do not exist on your system, the following error message is displayed.

"Plugin file not found in configured location. Press "OK" to open Plugin update settings."

- **NOTE:** Ensure the system connects to the Internet and the **ftp.dell.com** is accessible.
- **6** In the Browse For Folder window, navigate to the folder on your local drive, where you want to export the SUU, and click **OK**.
- Click Finish.

Configuring the New Plugin Notification Settings

You can configure the settings for the SUU and Deployment Media plugins from the Repository Manager Plugins wizard.

To configure the plugin notification settings:

- On the Repository Manager screen, click the Plugin Update icon after the plugins are downloaded.
- In the Repository Manager Plugins window, click Settings.
- Select one of the following options:
 - Automatically download new plugins when application is launched
 - Notify me of new plugins when application is launched
 - Manual check for new plugins



NOTE: When you launch RM for the first time and if the **Automatically import** ftp.dell.com check box in the Welcome to Repository Manager window is selected, the Repository Manager Plugin Notifications Settings window is displayed after the catalog is downloaded. Else, it is displayed immediately after the Welcome to Repository Manager window is closed.

- **4** Under the Source of Plugin Update, select Online (ftp.dell.com) to download the latest version of the plugin.
 - Alternatively, select the **Folder** option to update the plugin from a local folder on your system. Click **Browse** to navigate to the location where the plugin update is located.
- 5 Click OK.

Downloading SUU and Deployment Media Plugins

You can update the SUU and Deployment Media plugins for bundle(s) or download and save them on your system.

To download a SUU or Deployment Media plugin:

- 1 On the Repository Manager screen, click the Plugin Update icon. The Repository Manager Plugins window is displayed with the following information:
 - the name of the plugin
 - the current and new versions of the plugin
- **2** To update the plugins on your system, select the check box corresponding to the plugin.
- **3** To save a copy of the plugin, select the **Save a copy of the latest plugins to:** check box and provide the path where you want to save the plugin.
- **4** Click **Download**. The **Downloading Plugins** window is displayed to show the progress of the download.

Customizing Bundles

You can customize the Dell recommended bundle(s) as per your needs by removing components, adding DUPs, or modifying the titles of bundle(s).

To customize bundle(s):

- 1 In the Components tab, select the system bundle you want to customize, from the Selected Bundles drop-down list.
- **2** When you add or remove components, the following message is displayed:

```
"You are about to modify a Dell recommended bundle(s). Please test the bundle(s) before deployment if you want to continue."
```

3 Click **OK** to proceed with the changes.

Customizing the Script for Deployment

You can use your customized BASH script instead of the Dell default script, or append the custom script to default script in the ISO, for deploying Linux bundle(s) on the server.

To customize the script for deployment:

- 1 Load or import a repository.
- **2** Click the **Bundles** tab.
- **3** Select the bundle(s) you want to export from the list of displayed bundle(s), and click **Export**.
- 4 In the Export Bundle(s) window, click Next.
- 5 In the Export Destination window, select Deployment Media (Using Linux Bundles), and click Next.
 - **NOTE:** The **Deployment Media (Using Linux Bundles)** option is enabled only for Linux bundle(s).
- **6** The version number of available plugin appears. Click **Next**.
- 7 In the Browse For Folder window, navigate to the folder on your local drive, where your customized script is located, and click OK.
- In the Select custom Bundle Script window, select Yes to include a custom script in the deployment media.
- **9** Under Select custom script, select one of the following:

- Replace default script with custom script to execute the customized script instead of the Dell default script. Click Browse to navigate to the folder where the customized script is located.
- Append custom script to default script to execute the customized script after the Dell default script is executed.
- **NOTE**: Ensure the customized script is of '.sh' format.
- **NOTE:** Ensure that the script is edited and saved in UNIX format. Scripts with Windows end-line characters are unusable.
- 10 Click Next.
- 11 The Export Summary window displays details of the selected bundle(s), destination properties, and custom bundle script used.

Creating Bootable USB Keys for Deployment Updates

You can create bootable USB keys for deployment updates, using any third-party or free tool.

To create bootable USB keys, using the tool - UNetBootIn as an example:

- 1 Download the UNetBootIn for Windows available at: sourceforge.net/projects/unetbootin/files/UNetbootin/442/unetbootin-windows-442.exe/download.
- **2** Launch RM and generate the deployment media.
- **3** Start UNetBootIn and select the **Diskimage** option.
- **4** Click [...] adjacent to the ISO dropdown and navigate to the ISO created by RM.
- **5** Ensure that the type setting is equal to USB Drive and the location where you want to download the USB key appears in the drive dropdown.
- **6** Click **OK** to start the USB writing.
- **7** After the USB key writing is complete, insert the USB Key into a USB port on the system you want to upgrade.
- **8** Press **<Fl1>**. The boot menu is displayed.

- **9** Select the USB key as the boot target.
- 10 Select option I in the UNetBootIn menu's boot menu to proceed with the component updates.

Working With Components

Components are also known as Dell Update Packages (DUPs). They are used for updating the Basic Input Output System (BIOS), firmware, and drivers on specific platforms.

The list of components you add appear in the Components tab. You can sort the list of components based on file name, type, version, criticality, and the date on which the component was created.

You can view the number of components in the list and the number of components you select, at the top of the list. The numbers are displayed in the format:

<Selected/Total>

You can also view the total size of the components you select at the top of the list. The size is displayed in MB or GB.

Viewing the Size of Components

In the Components tab, you can view the size of all the components you select in the repository, at the top of the components list. The size is displayed in MB or GB.

You can also view the size of individual components in the Size column, in the components list.

To view the size of a component, click the Get Size link corresponding to the component.



NOTE: The **Get Size** link is displayed only for components for which the size is not fetched while the repository is loaded.

Adding Components

You can add components from other bundle(s) and repositories to the bundle or repository you select.

To add components:

- 1 Select the repository to which you want to add the component.
- **2** On the Components tab, click Add.
- 3 In the Select DUP File to Add window, select the component that you want to add. You can browse and search for the component from all the repositories available on your system.
- **4** RM adds the component to the repository and the following message appears:

```
"DUP File(s) Imported successfully."
```



NOTE: The selected file must be a DUP and digitally signed by Dell. Else, the file is not imported into the repository.

Removing Components

You can remove components from a bundle or a repository.

To remove components:

1 On the Components tab select the component you want to remove, and click Remove.

If the selected components are not assigned to any bundle in the repository, the following message is displayed:


"Do you want to remove the <number of selected components> selected component(s) from the selected repository?"

If the selected components are assigned to any bundle in the repository, the following message is displayed:

"Do you want to remove the <number of selected components> selected component(s) from these bundles:

<name of bundle>"

2 Click Yes to proceed.



Downloading Components

You can download one or multiple components to the local drives on your system.

To download components:

- In the Components tab, select the component you want to download.
- 2 Click Download.
- **3** In the Browse For Folder window, navigate to the folder on your local drive where you want to download the component.
- Click **OK**. The component is downloaded to the location.

Exporting Components

To export components:

- Select the repository to which you want to export the component.
- 2 On the Components tab, select the component(s) to export.
- **3** Click Export.
- **4** In the Export Component(s) window, click Next.
- Select the export destination, and click Finish. For more information on selecting the export destination, see Selecting a Destination for Component Exports.



NOTE: To add a component to a bundle, first add the component to the repository the bundle belongs to, and then export it to the bundle.

After the components are exported, the number of components exported and the number of bundle(s) they are exported to, appear in the **Export Components** screen.

If any errors or warnings occur during the export of components, click Errors/Warnings to view the details in the Errors and Warnings window.

Selecting a Destination for Component Exports

You can select an export destination for the components, in the **Export Destination** window.

Table 4-7 lists the options in the **Export Destination** window.

Viewing Component Properties

You can view properties of components in the Components tab.

To view component properties:

- 1 In the Components tab, select the component whose properties you want to view.
- 2 Click Properties.

The Component Properties window is displayed with the following details:

File name, Path, Version, Release ID, Release Date, Update Type, Category, Criticality of the component Description, Supported OS Versions, Supported Platforms, Supported Devices, Size, and PCI device information supported by the component.

3 Click Close to return to the Components tab.



NOTE: The **Properties** button is enabled only when you select one component.

Working With Filters

RM has an extensive search mechanism that allows you to query repositories, create filters, save, and load filters. Using the filtering capability of RM, you can view specific bundle(s) and Dell Update Packages (DUPs) from any selected repository.

You can create filters based on the following criteria:

- Text Search
- Update Type
- Criticality
- Form factors such as rack, tower, blade
- Component versions
- Dell Update Package Format
- Operating systems
- Platforms
- Devices
- Release date
- PCI device information
- Driver Packs

Creating Filters

You can create filters at the bundle level or component level.

To create a filter:

- On the **Repository Manager** screen, select a repository whose bundle(s) and components you want to search, from the Repository Information drop-down. The bundle(s) and components for that repository are displayed on the right side.
- **2** Select the desired filter options to create a filter.



NOTE: The **Search Filter** operation is different for bundle(s) and components. To share the filter across bundle(s) and components, save the filter and apply the saved filter at the respective **Bundles** or **Components** tab.

Table 4-8 lists the properties of the filters that you can base your search on:

Creating a New Repository

To create a repository:

- 2 In the Welcome window, click Import a Repository.
 - If the Welcome window is closed, you can click the Open link on the Repository Manager screen to add a repository.
 - If you click **Import Repository**, the **Load Repository Manager** window appears with the status of the remote repository download process. For more information, see <u>Importing an Existing Repository</u>.
- 3 In the Create/Load Repository window, select Create New Repository and click Next.
- 4 In the Name and Description window, enter a name and description for your repository and click Next.
- **5** In the **Select Source Repository** window, select a source for the repository, and click **Next**. For more information on selecting the source, see Selecting a Source for the Repository.
- 6 In the Select Line of Business window, select a line of business, and click Next. For more information on selecting system models, see Selecting Line of Business.
- 7 In the Select System Model(s) window, select a system model(s), and click Next. For more information on selecting system models, see Selecting System Models.
 - The **Summary** window displays the properties of the repository based on your selections in the RM.
- **8** Click **Finish** to create the new repository. The number of components and unassigned components added to the repository appear in a window.
- **9** Click the Save icon on the Repository Manager screen to save the repository in the catalog file in the xml or cab format on your system. You can modify the name of the catalog file.
 - The **Repository Saved** window is displayed with the following message:

[&]quot;Download completed successfully"

The name of the repository and the number of component files downloaded added to the repository appears in the window.

You can customize repositories for Dell Client System Update (DCSU) and Dell Client Manager (DCM) applications. In this version, DCSU 1.1.1 A03, DCM 3.1 SP1, and higher versions are supported.



NOTE: You can customize the filename of the repository while saving it.



NOTE: Ensure that the components you add to the repository belong to a specified criteria. RM does not restrict you from adding components that do not belong to the specified criteria into the repository.

Selecting a Source for the Repository

You can select a source for the repository you want to create, from the Select Source Repository window.

Select one of the options listed in Table 5-2.

Importing an Existing Repository

To import an existing repository:

- **1** Launch RM.
- 2 In the Welcome window, click Import Repository. If the Welcome window is closed, click the Open link located at the top of the Repository Manager screen to add a repository.
 - If you click **Import Repository**, the **Load Repository Manager** window is displayed with the status of the remote repository download process.
- 3 In the Create/Load Repository window, select Load Existing Repository and click Next.
 - **NOTE:** When a **Catalog.cab** or individual update package is downloaded, RM verifies the Dell digital signature for the files. If the verification fails, the downloaded file is discarded and an error message is displayed.
 - After the repository is downloaded, RM fetches the sizes of the individual components. But if you skip the size fetching process, a link Get Size appears in the Size column corresponding to every component. Click the link to fetch the sizes of the files.
- 4 In the Select Source Repository window you can select one of the following options:
 - (Client) ftp.dell.com imports the repository from ftp.dell.com
 - NOTE: You cannot edit components contained in the repository stored on ftp.dell.com. Therefore, the Add, Remove, and Clone buttons on the Components tab are disabled if you are viewing the components from ftp.dell.com.
 - Local Repository Allows to import the repository stored on your system. Click Browse to specify the location of the local repository.
 - Recent Repositories Displays and allows to import one of the recent repositories that you created or imported using RM.

Click Next.

5 In the Summary window, click Finish to complete the import of the repository.

The number of DUPs imported and the name of the DUPs imported appear in the Adding Components to Repository screen.

Working With Components

Components are also known as Dell Update Packages (DUPs). They are used for updating the Basic Input Output System (BIOS), firmware, and drivers on specific platforms.

The list of components you add appear in the Components tab. You can sort the list of components based on file name, type, version, criticality, date on which the component was created, and size of the component.

You can view the number of components in the list and the number of components you select, at the top of the list. The numbers are displayed in the format:

<Selected/Total>

You can also view the total size of the components you select at the top of the list. The size is displayed in MB or GB.

Viewing the Size of Components

In the Components tab, you can view the size of all the components you select in the repository, at the top of the components list. The size is displayed in MB or GB.

You can also view the size of individual components in the Size column, in the components list.

To view the size of a component, click the Get Size link corresponding to the component.




NOTE: The **Get Size** link is displayed only for components for which the size is not fetched while the repository is loaded.

Adding Components

You can add components from other repositories to the repository you select. To add components:

- 1 Select the repository to which you want to add the component.
- 2 Click Add.
- **3** In the Select DUP File to Add window, select the component that you want to add. You can browse and search for the component from all the repositories available on your system.
- **4** RM adds the component to the repository and the following message is displayed:

```
"DUP File(s) Imported successfully."
```



Removing Components

You can remove components from a repository.

To remove components:

- **1** Select repository from which you want to remove a component(s).
- 2 Click Remove.

The following message is displayed:

- "Do you want to remove the <number of selected components> selected component(s) from the selected repository?"
- 3 Click Yes to proceed.

To export components:

- 1 Select the repository to which you want to export the component.
- **2** On the Components tab, select the component(s) to export.
- Click Export.

 components to an existing repository. Select the repository to export
 the components. Click Add to select repositories that are not
 displayed under Repositories.
 - Create a NEW Repository and copy component(s) into it to
 export components to a new repository that you create. In the Name
 and Description window, enter the name and description of the
 components. For information on creating a repository, see Creating a
 New Repository. Click Next.

The Export Summary window appears.

6 Click Finish to complete the export.

After the components are exported, the number of components exported and the number of and names of repositories they are exported to, appear in the **Export Components** screen.

Working With Filters

RM has an extensive search mechanism that allows you to query repositories, create filters, and save and load filters. Using the filtering capability of RM, you can view specific Dell Update Packages (DUPs) from any selected repository.

You can create filters based on the following options:

- Text Search
- Update Type
- Platforms
- Devices
- Component versions
- Dell Update Package Format
- Line of Business
- Criticality
- Release date
- PCI device information

Creating Filters

You can create filters at the component levels.

To create a filter:

- Select the repository you want to filter from the Repository Information drop-down list. The components for that repository are displayed on the right side.
- 2 Select and expand the filter option(s) listed on the Repository Manager screen to create a filter.

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Table 5-5 lists the properties of the filters that you can base your search on:

Frequently Asked Questions

This section lists some frequently asked questions about RM.

I do not see the Welcome screen everytime I launch the application. How can I make it appear?

On the **Welcome** screen, when you select the **Do not show again** check box, the **Welcome** screen does not appear when you launch the application each time.

To make the Welcome screen appear, delete the file **DoNotShow.tmp**:

On systems running Microsoft Windows XP and Windows Server 2003 operating systems:

On systems running Windows Vista, Windows Server 2008 and Windows 7 operating systems:

I cannot see all the bundles and components on the Bundles and Components tabs when I load my repository.

You may have used a filter that is hiding some of the bundles and components. Click **Clear Filter** to view all the bundles and components.

My search displays even those bundles that are not relevant to my systems.

Sometimes, RM searches the bundle and then the components inside that bundle. Select the check box next to the specific bundle and then click the Components tab. The components you see are the ones causing that bundle to appear as a search result.

I see an update present in support.dell.com but when I load the repository from ftp.dell.com using RM, I do not see that update.

RM loads the latest ftp.dell.com repository that is supported by Dell OpenManage. The content in this repository is released quarterly and follows a robust testing process. Occasionally, updates may be available on support.dell.com before the contents of the repository on ftp.dell.com are updated. If you want to add an update to your repository from support.dell.com, download the update locally, and click Add on the Components tab of RM.

How do I view the unassigned components in a repository?

Select a repository and click the Components tab. From the Selected Bundles drop-down list on the right side, select UnAssigned Components. Repository Manager displays the unassigned components. The UnAssigned Components option is not displayed if the repository does not have any unassigned components.

How do I edit the search criteria of the filter that I created.

In the left pane of RM, select the filter whose criteria you want to edit from the drop-down list located above the **Text Search** field. The features for which you specified the criteria are marked with *. You can edit the filter criteria for these features or specify new criteria.
