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CHAPTER 1: BEFORE YOU BEGIN

This section provides procedures for removing and installing the components in your computer. Unless otherwise noted, each procedure assumes that the following conditions exist:

- You have performed the steps in "Turning Off Your Computer" on page 7 and "Before Working Inside Your Computer" on page 8.
- You have read the safety information that shipped with your computer.
- A component can be replaced or—if purchased separately—installed by performing the removal procedure in reverse order.

The procedures in this document may require the following tools:

- Small flat-blade screwdriver
- Phillips screwdriver

Turning Off Your Computer



CAUTION: To avoid losing data, save and close all open files and exit all open programs before you turn off your computer.

- 1. Save and close all open files and exit all open programs.
- 2. Shut down the operating system; click **Start** (3), and click **Shut Down**. The computer turns off after the operating system shutdown process finishes.
- 3. Ensure that the computer is turned off. If your computer did not automatically turn off when you shut down the operating system, press and hold the power button until the computer turns off.

Before Working Inside Your Computer

Use the following safety guidelines to help protect your computer from potential damage and to help to ensure your own personal safety.







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









- If you have your computer's Service Tag:
 - a. Click Enter a Tag.
 - b. Enter your computer's Service Tag in the **Enter a service tag:** field, click **Go**, and proceed to step 4.

- If you do not have your computer's Service Tag:
 - a. Click Select Model.
 - b. Select the type of product in the Select Your Product Family list.
 - c. Select the product brand in the Select Your Product Line list.
 - d. Select the product model number in the **Select Your Product Model** list.



- **NOTE:** If you have selected a different model and want to start over again, click **Start Over** on the top right of the menu.
- e. Click Confirm.
- 4. A list of results appear on the screen. Click BIOS.
- 5. Click **Download Now** to download the latest BIOS file. The **File Download** window appears.
- 6. Click **Save** to save the file on your desktop. The file downloads to your desktop.
- 7. Click **Close** if the **Download Complete** window appears. The file icon appears on your desktop and is titled the same as the downloaded BIOS update file.
- 8. Double-click the file icon on the desktop and follow the procedures that appear on the screen.
